**THE KIRK PULPIT**

Preaching yesterday morning, the Minister, the Rev. T. H. B. Somers, said: There is a life of Christ written by Mary Austin, entitled (with at least some truth) "A Small Town Man." Christ's homeland was about half the size of Nova Scotia. The Sea of Galilee was not a sea; it was a lake about fifteen miles long and eight or ten miles wide. Some scholars believe that Jerusalem in His time was not much larger than Moncton is now and that Capernaum was perhaps as large as Summerside. He met nobody of importance, and it is doubtful if any of His contemporaries would have been remembered in that way. His very Cross was small; some poet has called it a "Tunny little cross." It did not then tower 'o'er the wrecks of time"; its crossbar was so close to the ground that a man holding a sponge on a reed could thus give the victim a drink—which Jesus refused. He must have been tempted in that moment to say, not only "What can I do?" but even, "What good have I done?" But He was dedicated. "The eternities of God were given to Him. Their life in turn seemed useless, but they changed the world. They were like that book, "The Imposition of Christ." It was probably not intended for publication. There is some evidence that it was meant only as a setting forth of a spiritual discipline for the Christian order known as the Little Brothers of the Common Life. But now it is, next to the Bible, one of the best loved books. We may not see the results of a life linked with that of Christ. Why should we ask to see? We may not receive the answers, as if it were something enough; we see the promise from afar, and are persuaded of it, and travel as pilgrims to a land where the promise of God becomes fact and life.


