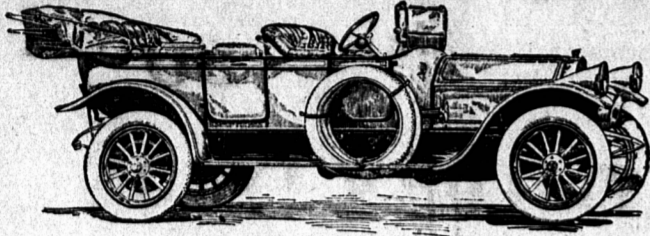

—FOX MEETING.—The annual meeting of the Magic Silver Black Fox Hatching Company was held in the office of Mr. C. D. McCallum, Summerside, on Tuesday, Aug. 26th. The manager's report showed the business of the Company to be in a most satisfactory condition and the dividend of 145 per cent. was equal to the expectations of the most sanguine. The stock of the company now consists of three pairs of breeders that that company produced and raised this year. —DIED IN ALBERTON.—A telegram received at Alberton announces the death of Capt. A. F. Larkin, of Gleichen, Alberta, which took place on Sunday last. Mr. Larkin evidently died very sudden, for up to a week ago, it was known by his son in Alberton, that he was in good health. Deceased was sixty-eight years of age and was a son of the late Alexander Larkin of Alberton. When a boy he assisted his father in the fish business at Tignish. Later he located in Sea Cow Pond where, on his own responsibility, he dealt largely in mackerel and cod-fish and also run one of the largest lobster canneries in the province, in which he accumulated considerable wealth. About six years ago, with his family, Mr. Larkin located in Gleichen and invested in real estate, and as in his native place, soon became one of the most influential and prominent citizens of that far off Western town. He was a town councillor for the past three years and was frequently pressed to run for Mayor. He is survived by his widow and seven children, James in Alberton and William M. in Montrose. The daughters are Miss Eliza Belle at home in Gleichen, Mrs. W. R. McKie and Mrs. G. Savage, in Calgary, Mrs. M. Compton, West Holme, B. O., and Mrs. W. J. Crockett, Duncan, B. C. He is also survived by five brothers, Capt. W. S. Larkin and James in Alberton, Robert and Lemuel in North Dakota and Rev. F. H. Larkin, Presbyterian Minister of Seaford, Ont. The surviving sisters are Mrs. Henry Newcombe and Miss Catherine in Port Hill and Mrs. (Rev.) A. B. McLeod, Marshfield, P. E. I. Mrs. Larkins and her daughter Miss Eliza Belle leave with the remains today for Alberton where interment will take place. They are expected to arrive Monday night in which case the funeral takes place Tuesday.—A.
