LONDON, Jan. 17.—To facilitate Canadian entries at the Lyons exhibition, the Hudson Bay Company have placed at the disposal of the Exporters' Association of Canada 50 tons of free space on a steamer sailing to a French port about January 23. Free transportation will be granted to those applying to Secretary H. J. Younge at Montreal. Arrangements have also been made with the Canadian Pacific Railway and the agents-general of all the provinces to utilize all available samples of Canadian products now in London.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency) on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon, and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along his homestead. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after carrying homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emptive patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$500 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$100. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

WOOL is unchanged, odd lots still coming to market. Washed fleece wool as to quality 40 to 44c. per lb. Washed rejections, (burry, cotted, chaffy, etc.) 33 to 35c. Unwashed fleece wool as to quality 30 to 34c. Northwestern unwashed according to quality 23 to 33c.

BEEFHIDES are lower and the market is weak. Tanners are only buying on a hand to mouth basis. City Butcher Hides green flat cured, 16 to 17c. Country Hides, flat cured, 15 to 15½c. per lb.

CALFSKINS are firm and coming to market in good supply. City skins green, flat, 18c. per lb. Country cured, 18 to 19c. per lb. Part cured, 17 to 18c. per lb. according to condition the Deacons or Bob Calf 75c. to \$1.25 each.

HORSEHIDES are stronger and in good demand. City take off \$4.50 to \$5.00. Country take off No. 1, \$4.00 to \$5.00. No. 2, \$2.50 to \$3.50.

KAISER IS NEARING DEATH
IS BROKEN HEARTED AT COLLAPSE OF HIS EMPIRE.

PARIS, Jan. 16.—A Rome despatch to the Journal says it has been learned from the Duke of Adragna, brother of the wife of Prince von Buelow, former German chancellor, that on account of Emperor William's sudden departure from Switzerland, where he has been staying for several months.

RUMORS IN GERMANY.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—The Amsterdam correspondent of the Daily Express says the Kaiser's condition is grave and there are rumors everywhere in Germany that he is dying.

The correspondent adds: “The Kaiser is confined to his private apartments and is nursed only by the Kaiserin, adding: “He is absolutely broken-hearted owing to the impending collapse of Germany's great military machine and the dangerous financial situation of the Empire.”

BOOST CROWN PRINCE.

“Color is given to the reports that the Kaiser is near death by a publication of extravagant eulogies of the achievements of the crown prince in the German press.”

A despatch from Geneva to the Daily Express says the first operation on the Kaiser's throat was a failure and a second operation has been ordered.

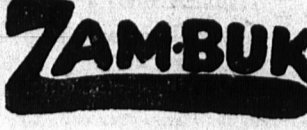
SON OF NOTED SCULPTOR KILLED IN ACTION
