DRAMATIC SUICIDE OF SAILOR IN MONTREAL

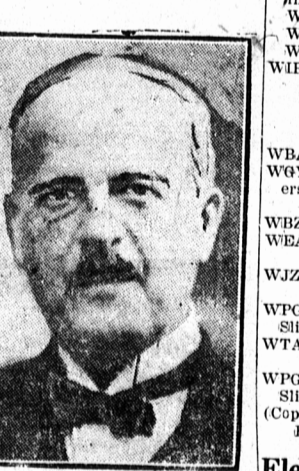

FRENCH GOVERNMENT ARE MAKING VISITORS TO COUNTRY HELP FINANCIAL SITUATION

Bar Profits at League of Nations Fall Off

GENEVA, Nov. 20.—Slow beer-drinkers have seriously cut down the receipts of the League Assembly's Bar, according to Melle Melle Gall, known as the "international barmaid." For the last four years she has held court at the marble counter of Hotel Victoria, adjoining the Hall of the Reformation. She has laddled out orangeade to M. Briand; lemon squash to Lord Cecil; international cocktails to the diplomats of fifty five countries and whiskies-soda to various visitors. But she confesses that 1926 was the worst year of her incumbency. "My bar's receipts for 1926 were only one half of what they were in 1925," said Melle Gall, "and 1925's receipts were barely half those of 1924. The German gentlemen this year did not go in for cocktails and liquors. A small glass of beer now and then, a coffee about four o'clock, seemed to satisfy them. Naturally there isn't the same profit in those drinks as there is in the others."

Oxford Girls Untidy

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Miss Dinah Gibbons, a B. A. of St. Hilda's college, Oxford, has become a mamequin at a costumer's shop in London. "One does not have to exert one's brains at all in this job, and that is a great relief," said Miss Gibbons after her first week. Miss Gibbons believes that college girls do not pay enough attention to dress. "At Oxford the young women dress deplorably, and they don't appear to care at all about looking tidy."

BLACKHEART OF POTATOES. (Experimental Farms Note.)

The potato tuber, which is in reality a short, thickened plant stem, is peculiarly subject to certain influences arising from improper storage practices. Abnormalities are thus created within the tuber itself which impair its vitality and disfigure it, thereby rendering it unfit for seed purposes as well as undesirable for table use. Among the abnormalities occurring from time to time is that commonly known as blackheart, an undesirable condition which appears as dark-brown or blackened irregularly-shaped areas in the internal tissues of the tuber, particularly in the central region. While affected tubers may appear quite normal externally, an examination of the interior will immediately reveal characteristic dark areas. Blackheart is caused by exposure of tubers to extreme, yet different sets of conditions. When potato tubers are stored for prolonged periods at extreme temperatures ranging from 35 degrees F. to 110 degrees F., changes occur within the tuber resulting in the death of tissues in the central area, thereby producing what has already been described as blackheart. Secondly, the subjecting of tubers at high or low (temperatures) to conditions where the necessary amount of oxygen required for respiration is lacking, also produces blackheart. In the first case mentioned, conditions might easily be avoided by storing tubers in a heated cellar or in a heated car, (intended for the conveyance of potatoes) being equipped with top, at a height of three to four feet, an improperly controlled source of heat. This would tend to produce extreme temperatures throughout the main body of the pile. The second cause is brought about by storing potatoes in improperly vented pits and heated cars, or piling tubers in ordinary bins to depths suitable for adequate circulation of air. Strict observance of the following recommendations of Agriculture at Ottawa, will, in a large measure, prevent the occurrence of blackheart. (1) Avoid overheating a storage cellar or heated car, by using a properly controlled source of heat from which the proper amount of warmth can be distributed and maintained with greatest safety. In the case of the cellar, the source of heat should be situated preferably in an adjoining chamber to become frozen quite solidly but not entirely through, a second foot of straw should be put on over this second six-inch layer of soil. (2) Provide adequate means of ventilation, particularly if potatoes are stored in large pits or bins at greater depths than five feet, by placing ventilators of appropriate design at six or seven inches in length and of convenient width can be nailed so that the openings on either side of the ventilators will be alternated. The resulting ventilator will be approximately six inches square, inside measurements. The first covering to be placed on the roots is a foot of straw, and if the weather is mild at the time of piling, no other covering need be put on for a few days. After that time the straw should be covered by about six inches of the surrounding soil. When this outer layer of soil has become frozen quite solidly but not entirely through, a second foot of straw should be put on over this second six-inch layer of soil. (3) Avoid piling potatoes to greater depths than three feet when the storage temperature ranges from 50 to 70° F., especially if the storage period will keep field roots satisfactorily over-looked is longer than a month.
