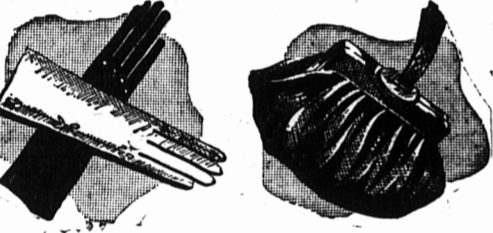

(Continued) FIRST ROADS IN LOTS 48 and 49. The first road in that part of the country was what was known as the Old Georgetown Road...

time. Another road, the one now in use, was started about a hundred yards west of the Hazelbrook Road, near what is now known as Creamery converging slightly and the running east in a line between the farms of Lot 48 and 49 being slightly north of the old boundary line...

LUMBER ROADS From Jenkins Hill it took a bend to the northward and continued along the northern edge of the swamp along which the Murray Harbour Railway runs. It was probably in the same place as the present road, to where Mount Albion school now stands...

after which it went on a fairly straight course to the Monaghan Road, near what is now known as Kelly's Corner. Another road, known as the Bumble Bee road, ran somewhat further south passing near what is now known as Moss Lake. This road got its name from a pine tree which stood on high ground about midway between Moss Lake and Lake Verde on land later owned by William B. Ballen and known in later years as the Ballen Farm...

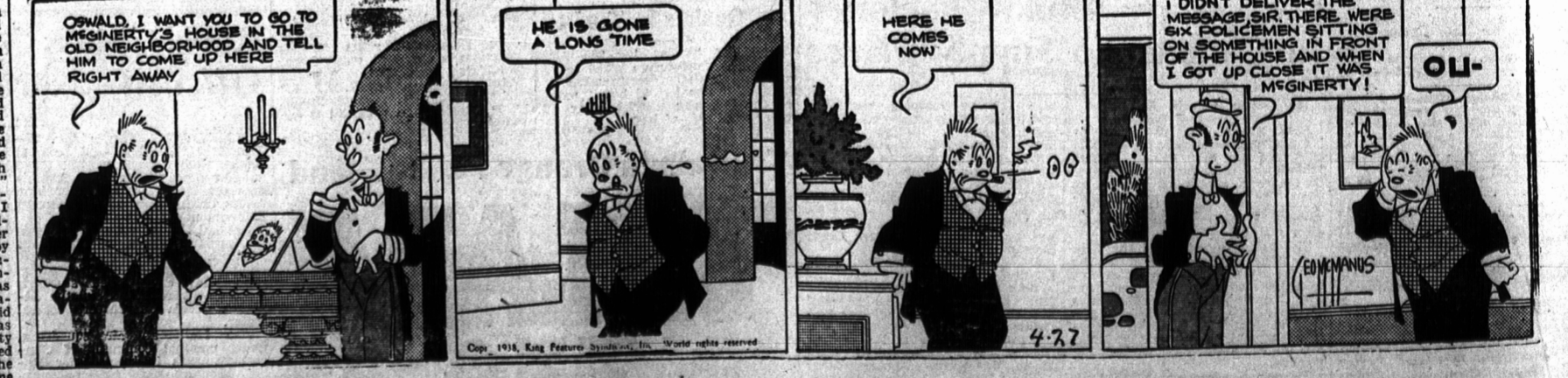

Nazis Suggest English BEERLIN, April 25—(CP)—The newspaper Frankfurter Zeitung published an article containing "instructions to schoolchildren" which explained preference given to the English language instead of French as a compulsory subject. "English is the language of a people related to Germany by race," the article explained. "The English language has become the vehicle of world economy. One of the foundations of English civilization is the importance attached to physical health and strength of character." The article suggested teachers stress the importance of racial questions in English courses, as well as the role played by "pure Nordic blood" in the creation and organization of the British Empire.
