Rev. G. J. Bond has accepted the call to the pastorate of the Grafton St. Methodist church at Halifax, at the commencement of the next conference year. Rev. Mr. Bond is exceedingly well known here. He has been pastor of the Brunswick Street Methodist Church, in Halifax, as well as Editor of the Wesleyan for four years. Mr. Bond has also been editor of the Christian Guardian of Toronto. He has travelled extensively in the East, particularly in China and Japan and has taken a great interest in the Laymen's Missionary Movement.

At yesterday's session of the Westmorland (N. B.) Circuit Court at Dorchester the following case, which will interest many here, was disposed of: King vs. Amy Connolly, charged with obtaining money under false pretences in soliciting advertising in Moncton. Considerable interest was taken in the latter case as Mrs. Connolly carried on an advertising scheme in St. John and other places under the auspices of religious and charitable organizations. In Moncton, after she had entered into an agreement with the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Y. M. C. A. to give fifteen per cent of the money on the business done, but after the article appeared in the press commenting on the operations in St. John, the officers of the Y. M. C. A. auxiliary repudiated the contract and proceedings were taken by the police authorities against Mrs. Connolly, she being committed for trial. The grand jury here found no bill in the case.

The numerous friends in this city and province of E. Y. Rowland, the well known commercial man will regret to learn of his being laid up in Halifax as a result of an automobile accident. The Chronicle says: Mr. Rowland arrived in the City on Monday afternoon. He was about to take a train car about 8 o'clock that evening when the accident occurred. He was about to mount the car step when he was struck by an automobile and thrown to the pavement. Luckily he struck on a pile of earth, which had been deposited by the flow of water down North Street during the rainfall of the previous day and this probably saved him from more serious injury. He was dazed by the fall, but was assisted to a drug store. Blood was flowing from his head and it was feared he was badly cut. However the cut in the scalp was but a small one and the flow of blood was soon stopped, after which Mr. Rowland went back to the hotel. It is stated that the automobile was going quite slowly at the time. Mr. Rowland, himself, was so taken by surprise that he hardly knows exactly how the accident happened. He will be able to be out today or tomorrow.

WOMAN'S BODY FOUND BELOW NIAGARA FALLS

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont., Oct. 24.—The body of an unknown woman was found in the river below the falls at the Canadian landing of the Maid of the Mist by Captain William Thomas.

The body is that of a woman apparently about fifty years of age. A mass of gray hair covers the head. The body is clothed in a black skirt, black and white check waist, and white cotton underwear.

The lower portion of the body is missing, from the thighs down. The light arm is also torn off just above the wrist. The features are clearly, evidently those of a woman of refinement.

Captain Thomas noticed the mass of gray hair at the end of the steel rail projecting into the river which is used to haul little steamers ashore for the winter. Upon investigation he found that the hair anchored the upper portion of a woman's body to the shore.

The body apparently has not been in the water more than three days. The only mark of discoloration of it, aside from where the portion is missing, is a bruise under the right eye.

Archbishop O'Connell will be raised to the cardinalate at the next meeting of the consistory. While the Vatican refuses to deny or confirm the report, it is generally regarded as a fact that America will be given a larger representation in the college of cardinals than she now has. Cardinal Gibbons, of Baltimore, is now the only American member.

Msgr. Falconio is the first American citizen to serve as apostolic delegate to this country, having become naturalized many years ago. He was born in Italy and came over when still a young man. Before going to Washington, eight years ago he was the Vatican's representative to Canada.

Archbishop O'Connell was born in Lowell, Mass., and was ordained into the Catholic priesthood at Rome in 1884. He is regarded very highly by the Pope and has been chosen to represent the Vatican on numerous occasions. Since 1907 he has had charge of the archiepiscopal see at Boston.

AUSTRALIANS RUSH TO NEW GOLD FIELDS

MELBOURNE, Australia, Oct. 25.—Immigrants are arriving in Australia at the rate of one thousand per month, and are rapidly absorbing the available country districts.

It is charged that the Federal land tax added to the state taxes is frightening British capital away. Many orders have been received to realize on properties. Several million pounds are said to have been withdrawn, the bulk going to the Argentine.

The Bullfinch gold discovery gives promise of great stakes. In a jewellery shop is exhibited a stone from that district containing seven ounces of gold to the ton. Some specimens also indicate an average of four hundred ounces.

The rush has been started over Australia of expert seek-peggers and "wild-cat" promoters, and option hunters are crowding the fields. The Government has surveyed the township site, and within a month building blocks will be ready for auction.

The marvellous lode has not yet been found to extend beyond Bullfinch. The companies claim that it continues, and have located many claims beyond the district. There is a frantic speculation on the Adelaide and Melbourne Exchanges. Mr. Doollittle, who purchased the Bullfinch for twenty-five thousand pounds is now reckoned to be worth millions.

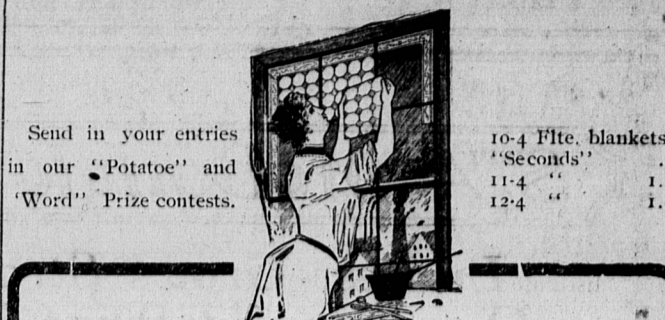

(Continued from page 1.) managing to work off without any serious damage. Hardly had the Kasenga left Calcutta on Sept. 7 for Boston and New York than she ran down and sank a native fishing schooner. There were no casualties. Backing away from the schooner the steamer landed in a mud bank. The rising tide released her.

While the steamer was loading tea and rubber at Colombo, the British steamer James, in preparing to sail, parted her stern line and ran against the Kasenga, nearly pushing her into the sea wall, but doing little damage.

An Arabic freeman, crazed by the heat of the fire-room, rushed on deck while the steamer was passing thro the Red Sea and jumped overboard. He was not seen again. Half-way across the Atlantic there was another suicide; a pet monkey belonging to one of the officers leaped into the sea. The remains of the voyage was unexciting, but Capt. Dots appeared unusually glad to make port today.
