After The Election

SOME THOUGHTS AND SUGGESTIONS AS TO THE PROVINCIAL SITUATION

(By W. L. Cotton.)

After the general election of 1919 there was much adverse criticism of the conduct of those Conservative Government candidates who had followed the bad example of their Liberal predecessors in having pre-election work done on the roads, bridges and public buildings. It was payment for this work that had, in large part, caused the deficit that was shown at the end of that year. The money had had, for the most part, been expended to bribe electors to vote for Government candidates. The Liberals who gained office in that year professed to be horrified. Never again they declared should the public money be so lavishly expended and wasted on the eve of an election—while a Liberal Government held control of the public treasury.

Yet we all saw, just before the last election, gangs of men working (or loitering) on the roads of the country in anticipation of the appeal to electors, and looking forward to payment out of the Provincial Treasury as a reward for their labors and for their support of the Government candidates. There was, at the same time, much wise talk about the importance of "making ends meet" and there has since been high laudation of the Government which contrived to make it appear that by "trebling taxation"—the financial position of the province has been improved—though there has been, meantime, an increase of \$12,000 or \$12,000 a year in the interest paid on account of that Provincial debt!

It is about time that the people of Prince Edward Island should consider the question whether it is worth while to maintain this small province an eternal contest between two political parties, the cost of which is so great and so (apparently) impossible to control. Why not have the Provincial Legislature established on the same basis as the City Council? In the City Council there is no party. All the Councilors are for the City? None of the city's money is expended for the streets, to bribe city electors. Each of the civic departments is managed and controlled by capable men whose election was obtained on the ground of ability, character and personal interest in the city's welfare. Every department is considered and discussed on its merits and not from the party point of view. Every matter decided upon by a majority is carried forward to a conclusion by the whole body corporate, usually without strife and always free from the expense and trouble entailed by party contests. Why not manage the Province on the same non-party principle? The effects of the city have been good. It is a sound reason why the effects would not also be good if the non-party principle were applied to the Province? The Government of the city has been comparatively satisfactory. Would not the government of the Province also be comparatively satisfactory if "Party" were eliminated from the Legislature and the Executive Council?

There are no difficult, no complicated matters to be dealt with in this small island province, because of the differences of opinion, the diverse views, that attend the creation and maintenance of a large country possessed of many and great interests and beset by hard-fought and obtained. To promote the agriculture and inland fisheries of the province is a matter to be dealt with at a minimum expense, in a large number of places in society. As members of the Government and Legislature are the simple duties of our office, these duties are within their reach. Some private firms in this city deal with a complicated and quietly it seems to be advisable to unite to do so with severely pruned results. There is no greater need for the division of the people into two parties in regard to provincial affairs, than there is in regard to civic affairs. Wonderful Machine For Maimed

LONDON, Aug. 2.—A machine for armless men—simple in design, and yet almost uncanny in its ingenuity—was demonstrated at a British Red Cross display in the Royal Botanic Gardens.

With the aid of a pair of metal levers attached to a table and manipulated by the feet, William Witt, who lost both arms in an accident four years ago, performed a series of operations to show what the machine could do. These included taking soup, drinking tea, peeling an egg, lighting a cigarette, working a sewing-machine, hammering in nails, playing draughts, writing, using a knife and a pair of scissors, and replacing various implements from an overturned toolbox. The utensils and tools used were ordinary ones, affixed to the levers by special attachments. The machine, the invention of W. J. Thompson an Edinburgh gas-fitter, seemed to be possessed of the acumen of a Robot.

Sir James Cantile, assisted by Councillor A. Evans, Commandant C. E. Evans, No. 1 V. A. D. and medical officers of the Hospital, and Miss G. G. Gidley, demonstrated many improved first aid methods.
