Miss Anne Matheson, teacher at Prince Street School, was a recent visitor to Montague where she visited many of her friends. Miss Matheson was a former teacher in the Montague High School in the Grade 7 and 8 department, and for the past four years was principal, teaching in the senior department. The new government wharf in Montague has been completed under the contract of Noye, Paynor and Bagwell. This immense task which was begun earlier this spring was completed after many months of hard labour. The work is a credit to the contractors, and a fine addition to the shipping facilities of the town. The wharf extends in a straight line for about 108 ft. and will provide ample space for the fall shipping season. Already the season has opened with the arrival of the H.W. Hann from Grand Banks, Nfld. and the Glimshire, from Bonaventure, Nfld. under the command of Captain Hyden. These two vessels are loading produce supplied by the local exporters; also every week the Una arrives to take produce and passengers to Nova Scotia. With the completion of the Stevens Wharf, Montague is now provided with ample wharf facilities to handle the fall shipping, which according to reports will be quite extensive this year.

During the past number of years the Montague River has had a severe fill-in, so that the river is gradually becoming blocked, and eventually the larger type of ship would have found it impossible to come up the river. Last winter a government survey was made of this fill-in, and it was found that it had reached considerable proportions, necessitating dredging in the near future. On Wednesday, Dredge No. 14 arrived in Montague after having worked for some days dredging at the ferry wharf at Lower Montague. It is possible that the No. 14 may do some dredging in the worst parts of the river so that the danger of too heavy a fill-in may be eliminated. The dredge is under the command of Captain Alex MacLean of Fairview. Before any other work is to be done however, the dredge will remove some old piles which are still at the front of the new wharf. It is understood that this work will be quickly completed.
