Webster, Cornwall, Mrs. Harry Laird, Cra-paud, Louise Dawson, a student at Prince of Wales College, and Mamie, Oliver and Gladys at home.

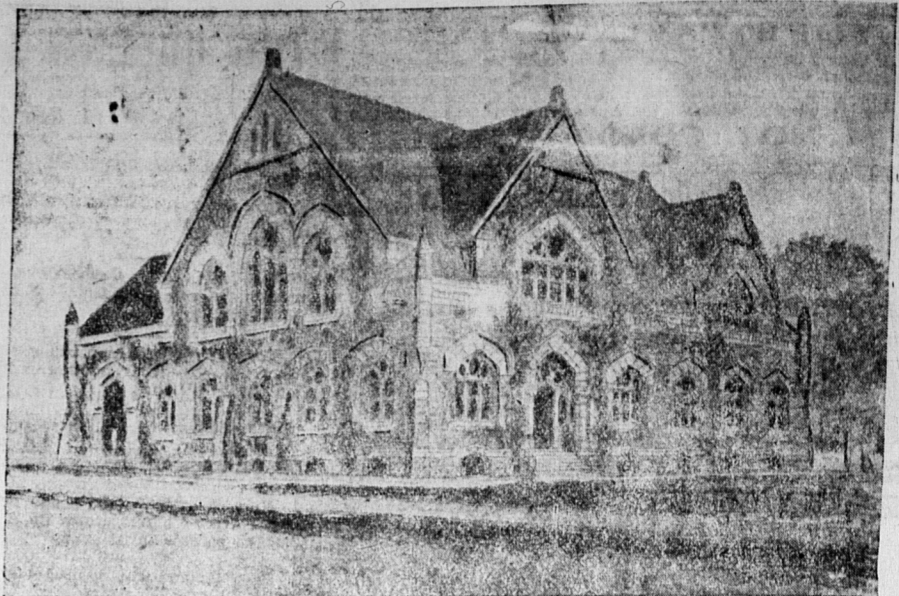
