Rhea Mae is Winner Of Free-For-All, Five Classes on Day's Program

The Goodwill two-days race meet at the Charlottetown Driving Park track concluded about 7 o'clock last evening. Many consider it one of the best in the long history of the Provincial Exhibition Association. Certainly the card of five races yesterday afternoon will stand out in the memory of every one present for its great racing and spectacular finishes. Not in a long time, certainly not in our memory, have five events with such evenly matched horses been programmed on a local or Maritime track and the enthusiastic spectators, many of them from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, gave great credit to the horsemen and all those connected with the Goodwill Meet for their excellent co-operation.

Dr. F. C. Dougan, City Councillor, the starter, called the horses for 1:30 p.m. and the first class responded right on the dot. He pushed the program right along but accidents to harness and sulks and some bad actors prevented its conclusion before the time stated above.

Highlights of the afternoon were the straight heat win by Jean Henley, 2:08 1-2, of the first event on the card, the winning of the classified trot, No. 2, by the handy, well-mannered Yolo, after Mae Lee, 2:16 1-4, from Saint John capped the first heat.

Great interest was taken in the free-for-all trot and pace and five good-mannered horses put on a great show. Each heat was characterized by close decisions, making for uncertainty until the conclusion of the event. The Great G, 2:02 1-2, recently imported from

The following is a brief summary of yesterday's events:

2:15 to 2:15 Trot and Pace
Jean Henley won in straight heats. In the last she got away in an outside position but she apparently did not trouble her. Trotter Sunnymede, 2:07 1-4 was a good second in the first heat and four, three, the next two. Top Hat, 2:07 1-4, formerly of the Wachen Stables, Fort Fairfield, Maine, was three, two, two, the trotter, Watchchim, 2:07, that many expected to lower the track record, was not at the best. He showed terrific speed but made frequent breaks. His best summary was third in the second heat. The fastest heat was in 2:12.

Classified Trot No. 2
Eight good young trotters lined up for the word and put up a good race all through. In the first heat, the best in position but the trotter, Johnstone, Saint John, graded the pole before the first turn was reached and never lost it but was closely pressed by the trotter, Watchchim, Mickey Yolo, one, one, the next two heats and took the lead in the second of 2:15 1-2, and gave every appearance of having a good future. The St. Stephen's, 2:16 1-2, was next best with four, three, two, three, four, Rubby Volo, Star Junior, Ina Kalmuck and Christ the Trotter, helped to make the race a most interesting one.

Free-For-All Trot and Pace
Five good-mannered horses, with fast records, two of them the fastest made in Canada this season, namely Jolly, 2:05 1-4, and Chestnut Bars, 2:06 (B.F. Poley), The Great G, 2:02 1-2, Rhea Mae, 2:04 1-2, fresh from victories on the mainland and the Sydney owned Hal B. Direct, 2:04, holder of the New Glasgow track record of 2:06 1-4.

The first heat was notable for the fight between the five horses for places right from the word go. The Great G, got into a nice spot in a strong position and tried everyone to their feet won by a short head from the Amherst-owned Rhea Mae, 2:04 1-2, and this heat was great fight between all the horses, with the exception of Hal B. Direct who was drawn the third heat.

Rhea Mae and Jolity in the third heat staged a last-chance duel, that, considering the condition of the track, was phenomenal, the time being 1:02 1-2.

Chestnut Bars, 2:06, who won so easily Old Home Week, was still out of form from his long campaign which extended from Quebec to Charlottetown. St. Stephen's, 2:16 1-2, Glasgow and back to Charlottetown. Jolity, 2:05 1-4, holder of the track record at Bridgewater, was a good but racing luck went to his rival, Rhea Mae, 2:04 1-2.

The driver of the afternoon was Joe O'Brien of New Glasgow who also headed the list the day previously. Joe won the free-for-all with Rhea Mae and the 2:17 to 2:20 with Peter Reamore.

Other race winning drivers were Willard Kelly, Tyndall Semple, and Mike Jabalee.

2:17 to 2:20 Pace, Classified
There were nine starters and it took a lot of scoring to get them away on anything like even terms. Peter Reamore won the first two heats and race. In the third heat he had the position scoring, according to the rules. Driver O'Brien tried for the heat but Peter Reamore got into a mix-up with Walt N. See, three, three, three, three, and as a result they finished last the third heat. No damage was done to drivers or horses.

Next to Peter Reamore, the best performer in the race was Lady Hal, 2:12 that was second the first two heats and the third with stable companion, Raymond Budlong, second, Ruben Lee, 2:10, had a surprise, three, three, three, three, Walt N. See, three, three, three, three, Sigin' Sam, three, three, three, three, Marchmont, Neil Cochotadale and H.M. Volo, all three, three, three, three, did their part to make the race a top-notch one. The fastest mile was the second heat, paced in 2:13-1/2.

2:25 Trot & Pace, Second Div.
There were 11 young pacers, all of them well regarded by owners and friends. Victory went to Grace Abbe, 2:17, recently purchased by Angelo Passerino of

North Sydney, N.S. This mare raced for years but had only won one race and that two weeks ago when she took a record of 2:17. The first heat she won in 2:17 yesterday in a nose and nose finish with Scotty McKane, 2:18, with Billy Bishop, right there, third, and Margaret Frisco a close fourth. Dr. Budlong, fifth. Don Worthy, sixth. An accident this heat and she didn't do him any good as he had to be drawn the next heat.

Lady Rose got caught in an accident the second heat and she was drawn the third heat. Both the above are promising pacers and put for poor racing luck might have taken new records.

Other performers that raced creditably in the event were Edith Grey, Dr. Budlong, Peter Jackson, and Miss Marjorie Hal. Nancy Budlong, 2:17, got in a mix-up the first heat but showed great form the second heat when she finished third.

Fastest heat was the final, won by Grace Abbe, in 2:14 1-4—a new record for Grace.

work was done, Dr. Wayne said, "But I believe a great deal more has been accomplished by the increased staff."

Miss MacLennan's Report

Miss MacLennan in a report said that the major activity of the two field nurses has been that of tuberculin - testing school children and doing follow up work in 19 school districts.

The number of children who were tuberculin - tested last year numbered 1,759 and of that number 304 were found to be positive reactors. X-ray examinations were made of all the positive reactors and the parents were advised of the results.

In addition parents were urged to have all members of the household examined when the children through the tuberculin test showed that at some time they had been in direct contact with an open case of tuberculosis.

Miss MacLennan also listed the other activities of the league, including clinics, home nursing education, etc.

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
