bore devoid of supplies. Many commissions have been appointed across the list to investigate the forest supplies and prescribe remedies for the rapid depletion, but in many parts it is in a vain attempt that work is being done. For instance, the latest State to move in the matter of taking care of its important timber interests, Alabama (whose annual lumber output is valued at \$5,000,000), appropriated 4500 for carrying out the provisions of the act, providing a commission with various duties. The value \$45,000,000, devoted less than great State of Minnesota whose forest products in one year approach in value \$12,000 to its forests. Interests and \$20,000 on prairie planting. The State of Maine, which still cuts around one billion feet, and is indebted to the forest for a product of \$18,000,000 in value, keeps within the modest sum of \$25,000 to pay for the protection against fire and the support of a commissioner. Examples of such pitiful and inadequate measures are found in many other States.

The only two States which have not hesitated to spend money for forestry purposes are New York and Pennsylvania. The former, in purchasing forest land for a preserve, which comprises about one and a half million acres only, has expended millions of dollars, and is annually appropriating money for further purchase, besides liberal provision for its forest, fish and game Commission. But, alas! the policy of forest reservation which has begun on economic grounds, has degenerated into providing a pleasure ground—a park for the wealthy, and there is little consideration to economic forest questions given by the State of the Commission. Pennsylvania is the only State which can be said to have started on a true policy of recuperation, buying up waste lands, protecting them, and in a small way beginning to reforest them, an appropriation of about \$500,000 being at the disposal of the Forest Commission.

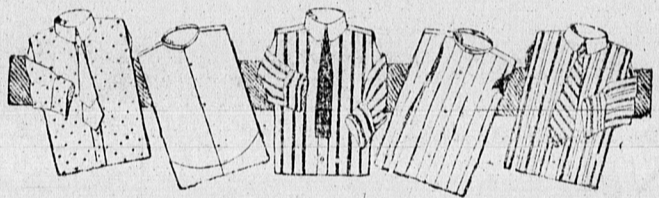

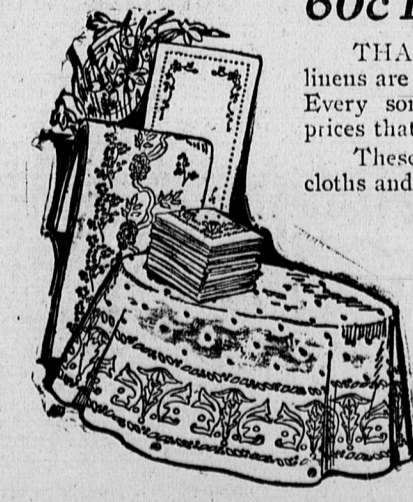

STRIKE POSTPONED YET MEN REFUSE TO WORK.

LONDON, Aug. 4.—The decision to call a general strike here of Dock Laborers has been postponed indefinitely. 20,000 men went out this morning. The Chamber of Commerce however, is making attempts to have the dispute arbitrated and pending the outcome the general strike will be held in abeyance.

Ships which arrived in port since yesterday will be sent to Continental ports to have their cargoes discharged. The dock laborers at Continental ports have been advised not to handle goods.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT TO ADJOURN AUG. 18.

LONDON, Aug. 3.—The Government's legislative program has become so congested that the Cabinet has decided to resort to an autumn session, and yesterday officially informed the House of Commons that Parliament would be adjourned on August 18th to reassemble in the end of October or beginning of November. The interim will be occupied with the disposal of the Veto Bill on August 8th and the rest of the week devoted to the overdue Finance Bill and a resolution providing for the payment of members.
