SOLDIERS' FURLONGHS.—Mr. A. E. MacLean, M. L. A., recently wired the Minister of Militia and Defence asking to whom of the overseas forces furloughs would be granted. He received the following reply:—"Arrangements made for furlough to Canada of First Contingent include only married N. C. O.'s and men whose families are residing in Canada." This is in line with the policy announced some time ago by the Department and the "originals" have been arriving in batches of about 1100 for some weeks. It is hoped that the same policy will be followed with reference to other units.






