We, the jury empanelled to inquire into the death of Baby Pursey, find in accordance with the autopsy, that the aforesaid child came to its death by suffocation, but according to the evidence of witnesses, it appears to us that it was by bed clothing accidentally covering baby's face.

JOHN K. MCKENZIE

The late John K. McKenzie whose death was recently announced in the columns of this paper was a native of Canoe Cove being born there 78 years ago, and many of his old friends at home and abroad will hear of his departure with tender recollections and regret.

The deceased was a man of general and winsome personality. Hospitable at home and sociable abroad he had acquired during his life time a host of friends, few of whom he ever lost. In his early manhood he learned the trade of shoemaking and shortly after his apprenticeship he married Miss Isabel McKay, of De Sable, P. E. Island. For upwards of twenty years he and his family resided in his native district at Canoe Cove Corner where during the winter months he carried on his trade of shoemaking and repairing and many a fine old knee-boot came from his hands. In summer he followed the occupation of lobster canning. During all these years his home was a centre of sociability and pastime for the young people of the community and many a pleasant winter evening was spent by his fireside.

Over thirty years ago he and his family moved to Charlottetown, where he secured a position on the Prince Edward Island Railway which he held till he was retired.
