GENERAL SMUTS SNEERS AT THE SUPREME COURT

LONDON, Feb. 9.—Special despatches from Cape Town state that General Smuts, Minister of Defence, referred sneeringly to previous Supreme Court trials as farces, and ridiculed the idea that if the Government had waited Parliament would have voted in favor of the deportation. He says General Smuts caused a sensation by announcing that the police had prepared a much longer list of men for deportation, from which only a selection had been made, adding: "A great number of consumptive scoundrels still remain in the country."

Cape Town, Union of South Africa, Feb. 9.—In the debate in Parliament today on the bill to indemnify the Government for its acts under martial law, Patrick Duncan, former Colonial Secretary of the Transvaal, strongly condemned the recent deportation of the strike leaders as not having been justified by their acts, and as not being conducive to industrial peace. Mr. Duncan said if the principle of right of judicial trial were thrown aside there would be nothing before the country but government by revolution.
