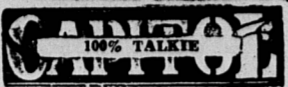
the injured boy a hundred yards away from the machine for fear that the plane would catch fire as their clothing was saturated with gasoline. S.

Improvements To Electric Plant

Among the improvements and additions which are being made to the electric light plant, preliminary to the installation of a 1500 kilowatt turbine next spring, the new steel stack, now half completed, has attracted much public attention. The stack will be 175 feet high and eight feet in diameter, by far the largest such structure in the province. With fine weather the work will be finished by the end of this week. The steel plates, used in construction, are five eighths of an inch at the bottom and one-fourth of an inch at the top. The foundation is built of concrete, and to this the stack is bolted by means of fourteen 2 1/2 inch bolts, each fourteen feet long. The cost of erection will amount to about \$9,400. A new boiler mechanically stoked and capable of developing 1000 horsepower, is also being installed in the plant, as well as feed water heaters and feed water pumps of sufficient capacity to serve the new boiler and the other two. New circular pumps will replace the old ones which are now too small. New brick walls and a new roof are being erected for the plant which will thus be practically fireproof. About twenty men from Ontario are employed in the erection of the stack and at the other work.

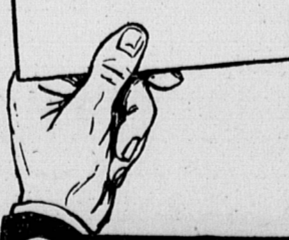

THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 3.—Fresh egg supplies on Canadian egg markets are scarce although receipts have started to increase in British Columbia. As a result of this scarcity of fresh eggs storage eggs are now moving into consumptive channels freely all over the country. Toronto, Nov. 3.—Fresh eggs are very scarce on this market and quite firm in prices. As a result storage eggs are moving more freely with quotations unchanged. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs extra 48 to 50, firsts 45 to 46, seconds 29 to 30, delivered, cases returned. Wholesale prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extra 53 to 58 cents, firsts 48 to 50, seconds 32. Montreal, Que., Nov. 3.—The shortage of fresh eggs is becoming acute on this market and prices are expected to again advance in the near future. One carload of pullet extras arrived from British Columbia during the week costing 43 delivered. Dealers continue to make quotations for local ungraded fresh at extra 45 to 54, firsts 40 to 45, pullet extra 40 to 41, seconds 28 to 31 delivered. Winnipeg, Nov. 3.—Receipts showed a further drop here for the current week and some shipments of firsts and pullet extras were brought in from British Columbia. Dealers' quotations to country shippers for ungraded eggs remain unchanged at extra 37, firsts 34, seconds 22, delivered, cases returned. Wholesale prices of fresh eggs to retail stores are unchanged. Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 3.—The local egg market remains strong and prices are firm. Receipts are reported to be up ten percent over last week but all grades except pullet extras are still scarce. Paying prices to producers are extra 45 to 46, firsts 41 to 43, pullet extra 35 to 36, small seconds 21 to 22. Wholesale prices to retailers are extra 51, firsts 46 to 48, pullet extra 40 to 42, small seconds 25 to 26. Chicago spot 30. November 21-34, December 22 1-2.

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 3.—Cheese and potatoes were lower and butter and eggs remained unchanged on the produce market here today. Trading was light. The cheese market was lower with asking prices for Ontario cheese being 14 cents and Quebec 13 1/2 cents a pound. Receipts totalled 857 boxes. A general decline featured today's potato market. New Brunswick Green Mountains extra track were \$1 while cobbiers and north shore mountains were selling at 90 cents and 80 cents per pound bag. Prince Edward Island cobbiers were 95 cents to 90 cents per pound bag. The butter market was quiet and unchanged with eastern townships number one pasteurized creamery quoted at 29 1-2 to 29 3-4 cents a pound in cartons while to retailers solids were 32 cents and prints 33 cents a pound. Receipts were fifty four boxes. Prices on the egg market were steady. Less than carlot prices for fresh extras were 53 to 55 cents, fresh firsts 45 cents and fresh seconds 30 to 32 cents a dozen. Receipts were 272 cases.
