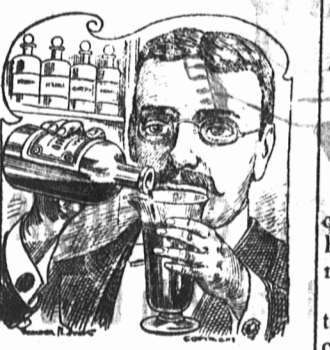

LOCAL INTEREST**

The Northern Agricultural Institute
will meet in Mayfield Hall on Monday
the 18th at 2 p. m. The resolution of the
committee appointed by the convention
of Institute delegates and the Dominion
Packaging Company will be submitted also
other important business.

It is likely in the course of a few days
that the Stanley will be sent to Sum-
merside and break the ice for the North-
umberland in order that she may begin her
summer service on the Summerside-
Pointe du Chene route. For the present the
Stanley and Minto will continue their
tri-weekly trips as at present. It is
probable that the Princess will make an
effort to reach Pictou on Monday.

CAPE WOLFE NOTES—The ice on the
straits here is fast breaking and in con-
sequence the horse racing, which has been
engaged in by some of the swiftest trotters
of Lot 17, has been suddenly stopped.
Miss Bernice Lidstone, after spending the
Easter holidays at her home, returned to
town on Monday, where she is attending
P. W. C.—Miss Ella Costata, who teaches
in Halliburton, spent Sunday at her home.
—Star of Hope Division is still in a
flourishing condition and is doing much
to instill into the minds of the youths of
this place the great cause of temperance.
—A very enjoyable concert and pie social
was held in our hall under the auspices
of the Methodist congregation on the
evening of April 6th. There was a good
attendance and a fine program. Among
those who took part were Jerry Dalton,
Miss M. Bix, Miss J. Dalton, Jesse Murray,
Miss W. Thomas. After the sale of the pies
the audience dispersed, well pleased
with the evening's entertainment.

ANSWERING Mr. Hackett, in the House
of Commons, the minister of railways said
the government had still under considera-
tion the construction of a branch line from
or near O'Leary station, on the P. E. I.
railway, to the west shore of the Island at
or near Cape Wolfe, and that the govern-
ment had not received any petition from
residents of New Brunswick asking for
this road. The government was aware that
the distance between the proposed termi-
nus on the island and the mainland in
Kent Co., N. B., is about 15 miles. No de-
cision had yet been reached with regard
to a sum in the estimates for this
work. Replying to Mr. F. Curry, Hon. Mr.
Emerson said it was the government's
intention to extend the Murray Harbor R.
R. beyond its present terminus at Murray
Harbor; a survey has been made under
the direction of Mr. McKee; the results
had not yet been ascertained. A station house
round house, wharf and warehouse with
necessary tracks will be provided at a
cost of about \$75,000. As to a series of
questions by Mr. Leurguy with respect to
the Murray Harbor branch expenditure,
the minister of railways declared to
answer, and advised the member to move
for an order of the house for the informa-
tion. The minister made the same answer
to Mr. Leurguy, who wanted to know if
the government had in view the con-
sideration of any branch lines in P. E.
I. land; also to other questions regarding
the cost and estimated cost of the Belfast
and Murray Harbor R. R., with particu-
lar of the work already done, etc.

ALBION CRO'S NOTES—Mrs. Malcolm
Matheson, who has been seriously ill for
some time is recovering.—The roads
which had been in fairly good condition of
late are now almost impassable owing to
the recent thaw.—Our school has been
closed since September last for want of a
teacher, and consequently we miss the
familiar sight of the "school boy with his
satchel and shining morning face, creep-
ing like a snail unwillingly to school."
Doubtless many of our small boys enjoy
the enforced vacation.—J. F. McDonald
teacher of Mount Hope has resigned.—
It is understood he intends retiring from
the profession at the end of the year.

the schools amalgamating; the case of
Albion and Mount Hope is one in which
amalgamation would prove beneficial.

of these districts in the near future.

Donald is a hustler, and has already
succeeded in placing a large number of
orders. Albion Cages Lodge is in a flour-
ishing condition, its members intent

upon "old King alcohol."—Owing to the un-
satisfactory condition of the pork market
very few hogs are being fattened in this
vicinity and many farmers are thinking
of giving up the business altogether. The
Guardian is the most popular paper in
this part of the country.—We expect a
large influx of courtiers and former
residents of Albion, Cross, when the
summer comes again.
