IN MEMORIAM
REV. SISTER ST. JAMES
(Mary Ann McCloskey)
Friends throughout this province will regret to hear of the death of Rev. Sister St. James (formerly Mary Ann McCloskey of Charlottetown, P. E. I.) at the Motherhouse of the Grey Nuns of Quebec, on November 24th, 1933, after several months illness. She entered the religious life 27 years ago and for many years was on the teaching staff of Mallett Academy and was later stationed at the City Hospital, Charlottetown, where she endeared herself to everyone regardless of class or creed.
The last 15 years of her life were spent caring for the aged at St. Bridget's Home, Quebec City, and visiting the poor and sick of the city. The funeral service was held on November 24th, the church being filled to capacity with the people of Quebec City, paying their last respects to one who had been for so many years a ministering angel in their midst. The funeral sermon was preached by Rev. Father Lambert of St. Patrick's Rectory.
Before entering the religious life she was for many years a valued clerk for the firm of Prowse Bros. Charlottetown.
She is survived by one brother and one sister, J. P. McCloskey and Mrs. M. M. Murphy, both of Charlottetown.

ALLEGED MURDERESS ILL IN JAIL
Dr. Alice L. Wynekoop Suffering From Hardening of Arteries, Has Little Hope of Recovering.
CHICAGO, Nov. 30.—(A.P.)—Dr. Alice L. Wynekoop looked up from her Bible in the county jail today and told her jailors she would not live to go on trial for murdering her daughter-in-law, Rheta.
The 62-year-old woman doctor admitted that death might be "long and tedious," but she declared her health never would permit her trial. She indicated that death would not be unwelcome.
"All the medical men in the world can't help me," she told Dr. Francis W. McNamara, jail physician. "My case—I have diagnosed it. I don't need other medical aid."
Dr. McNamara said the woman's condition was about the same as for several days. The only change was an increase in her pulse to the unusually fast rate of 110. She is suffering from hardening of the arteries.
Repudiates Confession
It was her feeling that death was near, Dr. Alice said, that caused her to repudiate a "confession" in which she admitted shooting Rheta, wife of her favorite son, in the act as the girl lay on her operating table from chloroform self-administered.
In another section of the jail, Earle Wynekoop, her son, spoke of trying to "find the real murderer of Rheta after his release," and asked again to see his mother.
Earle still was perturbed over a grand jury indictment charging his mother with murder. "She knows no more about it than I do," he said, "and that's exactly nothing."
He will be arraigned in felony court tomorrow as a participant in the alleged plotting of Rheta's death. "The charge is accessory before the fact. He has not been indicted."

Seeks To Form Church Cabinet
(Associated Press)
BERLIN, Nov. 30.—In the seclusion of his study Reichsbishop Ludwig Mueller wrestled today with the problem of reorganizing his church cabinet in a manner acceptable to all factions as well as Chancellor Adolf Hitler.
At the height of Germany's fierce religious battle over the interpretation of the Bible and other kindred issues, the entire church cabinet, governing body of all Protestant groups in the Reich, resigned last night.
Hedley T. Sheraton, Hazen Street, has received word of the sudden death of his aunt, Miss Jessie M. Sheraton, which occurred in Toronto after a few days' illness from bronchial pneumonia. Miss Sheraton was for many years superintendent of the Aberdeen Hospital at New Glasgow, N. S. She had made her home in Saint John for the past 12 years and was a member of St. John's (Stone) Church where she took an active part in the Woman's Auxiliary and other church organizations. She left Saint John for Toronto in September. Miss Sheraton was the sister of the late R. Sidney Sheraton and the late A. B. Sheraton of this city. Word of her death will be received by Saint John friends with regret. Funeral arrangements have not yet been completed.—St. John Telegraph-Journal.
Miss Sheraton had many friends in this Province, who will regret to learn of her death. She visited Charlottetown last summer.

Prize Winning Maple Leaf
MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—While New Brunswick captured the honor of producing the most beautiful autumn tinted maple leaf, British Columbia easily outstripped all the others in producing the largest leaf in the recent competition in which awards have been published. The honors in this phase of the competition and prize of \$5 went to six-year-old Bobby Hume, Revelstoke, B.C. The leaf measured 222 square inches.
The Judges, C. W. Simpson, R.C.A., R.W. Pilot, R.C.A., and James Crocker, in the most beautiful leaf competition, and J. M. R. Fairbairn, chief engineer, Canadian Pacific Railway, in the largest leaf competition, and their assistants who received, classified, and mounted the leaves, freely admitted they entered upon their duty under the impression that a maple leaf was, in brief, a maple leaf. They finished their task in the knowledge that there are more than 12 varieties.

Refuses To Talk In Rifle Probe
(Canadian Press)
TRURO, N. S., Nov. 30.—Charged with theft of a rifle from the Truro Armouries, Walter Douglas of North River was remanded until Monday when he appeared in police court today. Douglas said he purchased the rifle for \$15 but declined to identify the party from whom he purchased it.
Officers said they warned the accused he was liable to 10 to 15 years in penitentiary for refusing to give the information, and quoted him as replying:
"I've been there before and don't mind it very much. I knew there was something wrong with the rifle but I'd rather take another 'crack' in the 'pen' than tell who I got it from."
Seeks Route For Highway
Dr. Even Hedra is going into the sinking region of China in search of highways suitable for automobile transport between the interior and the coast. He will traverse the ancient route by which silk was carried to Rome and other parts of the world to the west.

Migrants Bill Is Passed
CANBERRA, Australia, Nov. 30.—(C. P. Cable)—The Australian Parliament last night passed through all stages the Migrants Bill appropriating \$500,000 for compensation to British settlers in Australia, following agreement with the Victoria government.
The governments are providing emergency payments for settlers who went to Victoria under the British Empire settlement plan some 10 years or so ago and have since become destitute. For those requesting, monetary compensation will be provided, \$1,500 if the applicant is married, with \$250 additional for each child, up to a maximum of \$2,500 per family, with \$1,000 for single men.

Onion Smut Coretral
As the organism causing onion smut thrives on decaying matter in the soil it frequently happens that soil planted continuously to onions becomes more and more infected, until a profitable crop of onions can no longer be grown on it. For this reason, many acres of land otherwise suited to onion growing are now devoted to less lucrative crops. The disease can be controlled by seed treatment, its prevention and control being dealt with at length in a publication issued by the Dominion Department of Agriculture on smut diseases of cultivated plants.
