NEW BUILDING OPERATIONS

A Review of The Many Buildings That Are

NOW IN COURSE OF ERECTION

The Prince of Wales College—Prince Edward Island Hospital—Addition To St. Dunstan's College—Condensed Milk Factory and Many Private Residences.

The end of the year 1899 will close one of the most prosperous seasons Charlottetown has ever experienced. The narrow and contracted halls and class rooms of the old Prince of Wales College will give way to the more commodious and handsome structure now nearing completion. The new Prince of Wales College, a costly building, the most expensive of those being erected this year, is the most modern building in the city. The foundation was laid in the fall of 1898 and the work has been in progress ever since, until now the exterior is nearing completion. The building is expected to be ready by the first of the year. The class rooms are large, two being located on the first floor 26 x 40 feet and four on the second floor are of the same size. In addition there are two class rooms for the Model School. The second floor contains the Assembly Hall which is 45 by 70 feet with a ceiling 23 feet high. The plastering is of selenite and the ceilings are of spruce. In the basement the janitor's quarters will be located. The construction throughout is of the most substantial kind, the basement being of Nova Scotia freestone; the walls of brick with a slate roof. There is no wood finish exposed on the outside, all moulding and finish being covered with galvanized iron. The plans of the College were drawn by Mr. C. B. Chappelle and the work is being done by Messrs. McDonald and Schurman.

The next public building is the New Prince Edward Island Hospital. The contract was let in June '98. The foundation was completed in 1898 and last spring the work was again taken up and pushed to completion. A description of the New Hospital appeared in the Daily Guardian of Feb. 4th, 1899. A cut of the building in this issue gives our readers an idea of the appearance. The heating plant is being supplied by the McEachern heating Co. of Ontario. The Hospital is the first building in the province with that system. Some fifteen men are now employed putting on the finish. The work is being pushed forward and it is expected that the building will be completed about the middle of November. The work is in the hands of Messrs. McDonald and Schurman. The plans for the hospital were also drawn by Mr. Chappelle.

Crossing the field from the magnificent site of the Hospital the writer comes to the Condensed Milk Factory. It is well under way and Mr. Harper is pushing it with all the rapidity possible. The building is 150 feet long by 38 feet wide with an addition on each side. The one on the north side is for the boiler room and that on the south for receiving room. The building is divided into three sections. On the western side is the condensing room 38x50 ft with a ceiling 21 feet high. The eastern section is a room of the same size; the center section is for a packing room and is 38x50 feet. The second floor will be used for storage. The outside is nearing completion and will be finished in about two weeks. The addition to St. Dunstan's College is another valuable improvement to one of the public institutions of the province. The addition is 40 x 100 feet and was built to the eastern end of St. Dunstan's College during the summer. The

first storey is devoted to the chapel, the basement to dining room and kitchen.
