OF LOCAL INTEREST.—Mr. D.R. Laird, Manager of the Bank of Nova Scotia, who have been in Boston and New York for several weeks receiving treatment for his ear, has returned to Amherst greatly improved in health.

SUCCESSFUL CRUISE.—Word was received yesterday by Mr. J. O. Hyndman that the steamer Sabie, of Halifax, now on a sealing trip in the Gulf, has been very successful, having secured over 20,000 seals. There are a number of Prince Edward Islanders interested in this ship and they will be pleased to learn of her success.

ICE BOATS.—Captain Howatt left Cape Traverse at 7.30 on Saturday morning with four boats, twenty bags of mail and 11 passengers, reaching Cape Tormentine at 11 o'clock. Captain McWilliams left Cape Tormentine at 6.50 a. m., with five boats carrying seventy bags of mail and sixteen passengers, and arrived at Cape Traverse at 11.50 a. m. The mail special arrived in this city at 1.45 p. m.

A COLLISION.—There was a nasty collision on Kent Street, Saturday afternoon in which Dr. Dorsey's horse and wagon were the principal sufferers. The doctor's horse was thrown to the ground and his wagon badly twisted but happily the horse was not hurt and was quickly helped to its feet by passersby. The other horse escaped unhurt but the low sleigh to which it was attached was somewhat damaged.

IN MILITARY CIRCLES.—Major C. Leigh, Recruiting Officer has been appointed to the command with Lieut. Bagnall, Provost, Messervy and Murphy. NEW FIELD ARTILLERY OFFICERS.—Word has been received of the appointment of the officers for the new Field Artillery depot for Charlottetown. Colonel Peake has been appointed to the command with Lieut. Bagnall, Provost, Messervy and Murphy. The captain will be appointed later. COUNTY COURT.—At the Summerville Court on Friday, before His Honor Judge McQuarrie, the case of Linkletter vs. Pollard, occupied most of the day. In this case the plaintiff, who was at the time the proprietor of a livery barn, claims the price of fifteen weeks board for a trotting horse at the rate of \$4 a week. The defendant alleges he made arrangements as to prices &c., with the stable man who is also a horse trainer and whom the defendant mistook for the manager of the barn. The trainer claims the price as arranged for included only training, fixings and other necessary attention to the horse which privilege he was allowed by the manager and that no bargain whatever was made about the horse. The case was concluded in the afternoon and judgment reserved until the 8th inst. Mr. Heath Street for plaintiff, Mr. A. C. Saunders for defendant.—H.

COLLEGE DEBATE.—The inter-collegiate debate between Dalhousie and Mount Allison, which took place in Halifax last week at the school for the blind, was won by Mount Allison. The subject was: "Resolved that the United States should have entered the present war on the side of the allies." Dalhousie taking the affirmative and Mount Allison the negative.

The judges were two justices of the supreme court of Nova Scotia, and a county court judge from New Brunswick, the Nova Scotia referees being Mr. Justice Harris and Mr. Justice Russell, and the New Brunswick referee Judge Jonah. The rules of the debate provide that no statement be made officially as to how the debate was won or as to how the judges stood in their decision but it is understood that two of them favored Mount Allison while one thought Dalhousie to be superior. The ability of the two teams in argument and presentation was pretty equal but, if anything, Mount Allison impressed the argument and Dalhousie in presentation. The palm of victory goes to Mt. Allison team consisted of R. V. Sharpe, Mr. Curtis and Mr. Withrow. The Dalhousians were F. H. Patterson, F. H. Anderson and J. T. Bonnell, the latter two being from Morell and Charlottetown respectively.—Halifax Exchange.

An exchange says:—"We regret the departure of Professor C. M. Wright from our town. The congregation of St. Andrew's will feel the loss very much. The whole town will suffer by the going away of such a talented and brilliant master of music in all its branches as Professor Wright is. It is certainly a distinct loss to the town to lose his services, and musical circles are poorer indeed by his going, but as he goes to better himself, it is something to take with him that he takes the respect and esteem and regard of all who have had the benefit of his wonderful, masterly knowledge in the science and art of music, both vocal and instrumental, and we trust and know where he is going, to the musical centre of Lunenburg, that his talents as a pianist and services will be appreciated as highly as here. All the good things the town knows and appreciate in Prof. Wright can also be said of Mrs. Wright and family, who are worthy helpmates to him in every possible way, and we trust the lines may fall to them in pleasant places."

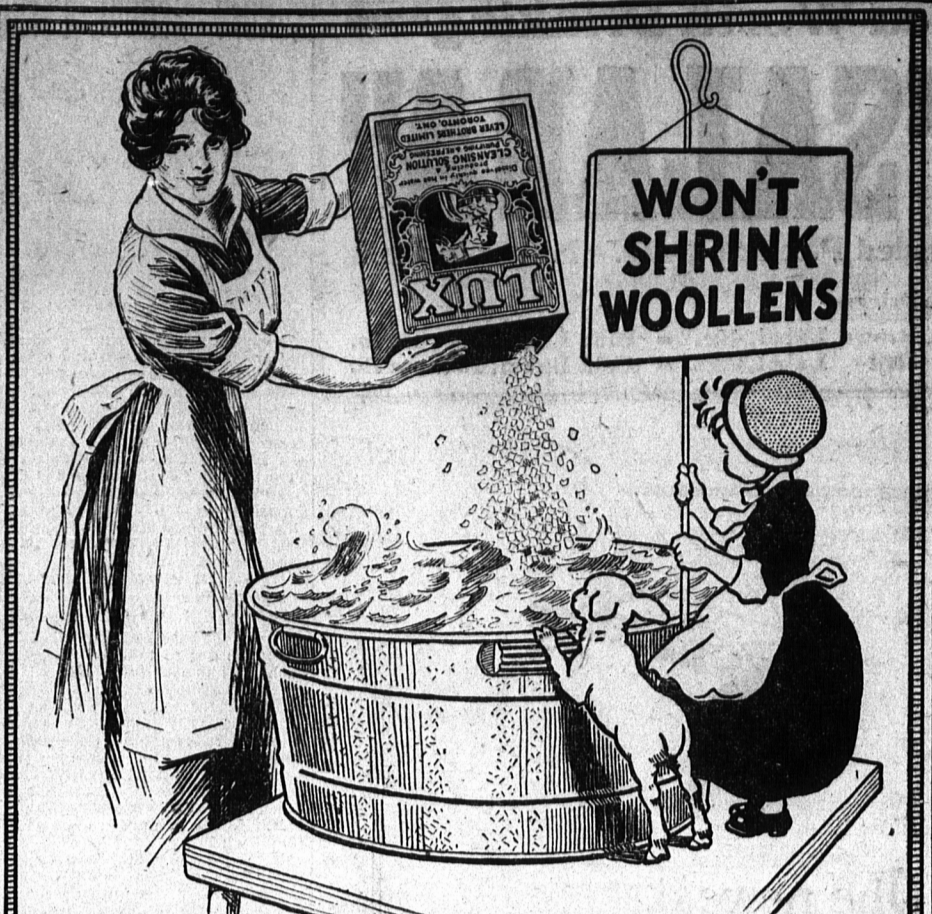

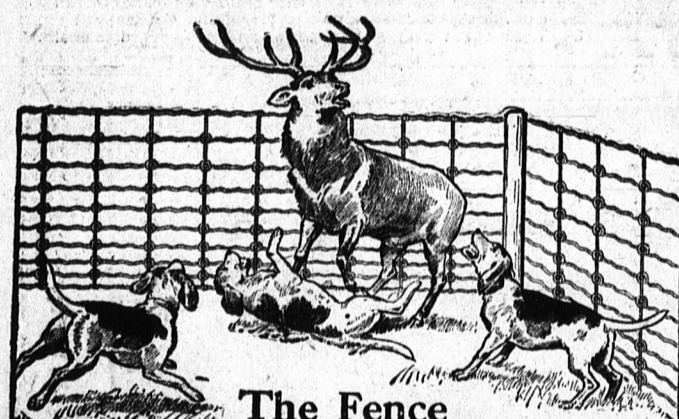
