Advices from Cape Traverse yesterday indicated that the ice conditions there were as follows: three miles open water on P. E. I. side, three miles broken up ice on N. From St. Peter's comes the word that there is nothing to be seen from the shore but open water, with the exception of the board ice.

As the members of the Institute had ordered separators to grade their seed grain more thoroughly the lecture caused great enthusiasm and we trust much profit will follow. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the Professor to which he replied expressing his great pleasure in attending Institute meetings. The next meeting will be held in Alberry Plains School-house Thursday evening, April 6th, for the purpose of receiving orders for seeds. If weather unfavorable the first fine evening following. SPRINGHILL, April 2—Six workmen from among the ranks of the strikers returned to work in the mines yesterday. They are property owners and among the finest type of men in the mining town. The return of these men to work makes a total of twelve for the week.

Major Thompson, commissioner of provincial police, will arrive to-day with a force of thirty men, who are fully equipped for efficient service.

It is expected that a large number of the strikers will return to work as soon as they are sure of protection from assault and insult, and it is generally believed that this will be forthcoming when Major Thompson takes charge.

Two of the town police were arrested on Saturday on a charge of interfering with the company's police.

## WOMAN LASSOES BARRISTER IN COURT

PARIS, April 1—After a sentence of twenty years' hard labor had been passed on an elderly widow for the murder of a relative, an unprecedented scene was witnessed in the Monthirion assize court. The woman had no sooner heard the words than she drew a lasso out of her dress and flung it with such unerring aim in the direction of the barrister acting for the family of the murdered man, that the nose encircled his neck, and as she tightened it he was pulled to the floor.

Had not several of his colleagues and the gendarmes in the hall hastened to the rescue, the unfortunate man would have been strangled outright. As for the excited and too skilful widow, a tremendous struggle ensued before she could be mastered.
