**BACKYARD GARDEN**  
(Continental Farm News)

All the exciting backyard garden work has to be done by hand labor, and to have a successful garden, the hand should be prepared in the fall.

Toward the end of October when the vegetable crops are harvested, the soil should be cleared of all weeds that have seeded and any diseased material burned.

Divide the garden into two strips. These strips are to be worked in alternate years. In the first year, the soil should be cleared of all weeds that have seeded and any diseased material burned.

Place a layer of soil from the compost heap or a layer of good barnyard manure in the bottom of the trench, which may be sand, gravel or clay. Then with a fork dig this over, remembering that this will be brought to the top when digging the following October. On this, place the top soil from the next trench, turning it upside down then place a good layer of barnyard manure 4 to 6 inches deep on top of this. Cover the manure with all loose soil from the bottom of the trench, and instead of leveling it on top, dig it in as if you were making dirt to plant potatoes. Fork over the bottom of the trench adding manure or compost soil as already mentioned. Continue in this way until garden is all turned

over. By working say one hour each evening a person would dig over a garden of 1,000 square feet in eight evenings. By rigging the soil instead of making it level, the soil is held better and this means more fertilizer for your garden. It is said that the snow is the "poor man's fertilizer". It will also dry out earlier in the spring, so that a few days can be gained in early seed sowing.

The winter's wood ashes can be spread over the land, also a limited amount of soot from the chimney or furnace, but not coal ashes unless the land is a very heavy clay soil, when a limited amount may be used each year. The average garden may be given a dressing of lime every five or six years, 40 pounds to each 1,000 square feet.

In the spring when preparing for seeding or planting, fork over the garden from end to end and mix the manure and soil well together, even to forking it over several times. The manure, when well mixed with the soil, causes the plants to make more roots and to take in more food.

**LONGER LIFE FOR MILK RUBBER PARTS**  
(Science Service Notes)  
Rubber of the quality required for milk inflations is very scarce these days. Consequently it is important that each milking machine owner does all he can to prolong the life of the rubber parts. This can be done by keeping them as clean as possible preventing their exposure to strong light, and by a periodic treatment to extract the butterfat which works into the pores of the rubber and ultimately makes it flabby. A treatment which originated in New Zealand, and which has given very good results at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, consists in boiling the inflations for four hours in a strong (4 per cent) caustic solution. Four heaping tea-

spoonfuls per quart of water, or 2 cans of household lye in 3 gallons of water is the solution recommended by the Division of Bacteriology and Dairy Research, Science Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture. The inflations are then removed and rinsed several times in hot water, brushing to remove any dirt loosened by the treatment. If the solution is allowed to cool undisturbed, a surprising amount of soap, formed through the interaction of the extracted butterfat and the lye, will solidify on the surface. Inflations treated in this manner once a month will have longer life, while in many cases the bacterial content of the milk drawn through the machine will be lower. A mimeographed sheet giving more detailed directions covering

this method may be had on application to the Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
