THE keepers of the city jail are directly opposed to the many derogatory statements which have been made about Fred Goodspeed and express their faith in his ability to develop into a good citizen. One of the officials said today that during the year he has been connected with the jail many boys have come under his notice but he has never yet had to do with a better boy than Fred Goodspeed. No matter how often any one passes his cell or meets him, he is always ready with a pleasant smile and a cheery "Good-day." His conduct since the first day of his imprisonment has been everything that could be desired and he has succeeded simply by being natural in making others trust him. "Goodspeed has been six months in jail yesterday," said the jailer, "and I can't say too much in praise of him in so far as regards his conduct with us. I don't believe the boy is half so bad as some people try to make out. I have watched him closely in the past six months and don't believe there is any reason why the reformatory should be made a prison on his account. If Goodspeed is treated the same as the rest of the boys out there I don't believe he will ever try to escape. But if he is shown that the others regard him as a desperate criminal that will undoubtedly have an effect on him—it would on any boy." Goodspeed has his things all packed up ready for removal to the reformatory.—St. John's Star.

THE sixth Annual Convention of the South East Prince District Sunday School Association, met in session at the Bedeque Baptist Church, Thursday Feb. 12th. The both sessions were well attended notwithstanding the rough day. After devotional exercises led by President minutes of previous meeting were read and adopted, also report of Secretary which is as follows:—Another year has rolled around and we by the grace of God are permitted to present once more the annual report of said district. We are

glad to report 17 schools this year, an increase of one. The total number of officers are as follows: 116, scholars, 818; total, 934; average, attendance, 550; added to the church 20; Home department members 97; amount spent for support of schools \$177.10 for missionary and benevolent purposes, \$34.90; inter-denominational work \$4.85. We note a decrease of 49 scholars. The comparison record is as follows: Albany B. decrease four; Appin Road increase seven; Augustine Cave and Bonshaw first report this year; Bedeque B. increase eight; Bedeque M. same; Chelton M. same; Cape Traverse M. same; Carleton North M. increase ten; Searlestown M. increase nine; Tryon B. same; Tryon M. decrease ten; Victoria M. decrease six; Westmorland B. decrease two; Much difficulty is encountered by the inclination of young men to stray away from the S. S. when they become a certain age, and therefore no doubt, this is the cause of the decrease in some schools. We hope to overcome this in the near future. We should press on and on to double our membership. Let our motto be, "upward and onward." After report a nominating committee was appointed, consisting of Albert Schurman, Thos. Moysé, Henry Lowther. By vote James Carruthers shared the privileges of the Convention. The nominating committee reported as follows:

It was decided to hold the July Convention in the Cape Traverse Methodist Church and that the date be left to the Field and District Secretaries. James Carruthers spoke a few words on the necessity of more parental teaching and closer connection between parents and scholars. Many questions were asked and profitably answered by our Field Worker, Rev. G. P. Raymond. The evening session was excellent, the new President in his place; devotional exercises led by Henry Lowther. Albert Schurman gave the address of welcome, and Mr. Carruthers replied in an appropriate manner. The Home Department was introduced very plainly and the fruit which followed that department of S. S. work was very satisfactory. Mr. Warren then read a very excellent paper on the "Absence of Juniors." It was worthy of comment. Rev. F. A. Wightman spoke very encouragingly to the many workers of the church of God and the reward that will follow their labors in that great cause. Our Field Secretary pointed out the great good done by the District and National Conventions as they create Christian fellowship. The development of human talent bringing into use the Home Department and having the influence of great men among us, and lastly because they were the originators of the interdenominational lessons. 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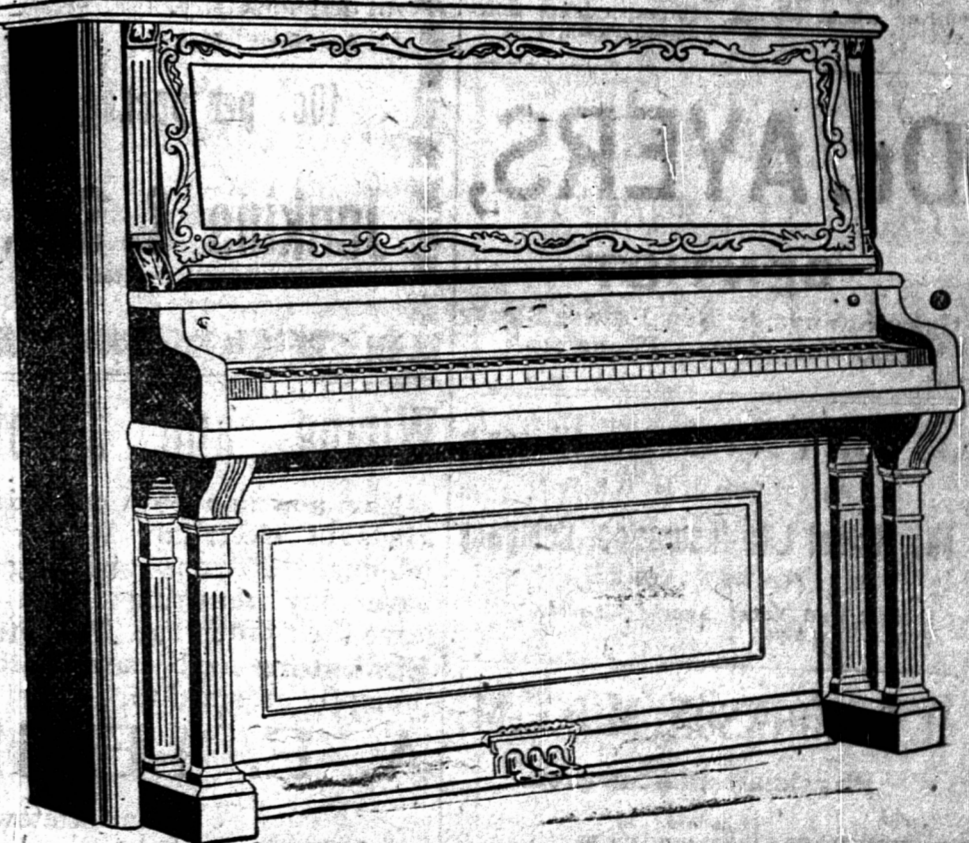
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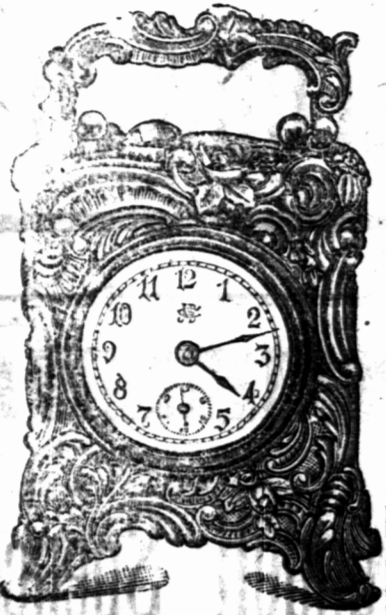
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
