Claim Stray Red Mines Drift To B. C.

(By The Canadian Press)

VANCOUVER, Aug. 3.—(Tuesday)—The Vancouver News-Herald said in a front-page story today that stray Russian mines are menacing shipping off the British Columbia coast.

The Pacific Ocean's Japanese current, running in an eastward direction and coastal tides were said capable of carrying the mines to this side of the ocean.

The story was based on reports from divers arriving here from the west coast of Vancouver Island. It said the mines were triggered by delicate detonating apparatus.

Coast fishermen, the story said maintain the mines do not conform with known types of Japanese mines and are definitely Russian weapons.

The detonators were said to be "secret and dangerous" and underwriters said an average of 2.3 mines a day has been reported in Pacific coastal waters during the last three months.

In United States and British waters, 197 mines have been sighted since April 20.

The News-Herald said the U.S. S.R. is the only country in the world to keep its harbors mined.
