Yesterday in conversation with a medical gentleman, he said: "The Government of this Province is doing nothing in regard to the carrying out of the vaccination law in the country districts and as a result the protection of the hundreds of schools throughout the Island is being neglected."

YESTERDAY a telephone message from Dalry stated that a large steamer apparently disabled was only three quarters of mile off Tracadie Sandhills in about eight fathoms of water. It was quite hazy at the time and it was impossible to tell what steamer it was. Just before dark it was noticed that the steamer had got under way and was apparently heading for East Point. A terrific storm was raging at the time with the breakers running out for about five miles. A later message stated that the tide had not been so high for a number of years.
