**SHIPBUILDING IN 1904.**

Figures furnished by Lloyd's Register of British and Foreign Shipping show that the total number of vessels launched throughout the world in 1904—merchants and war—was 1,745 with a gross tonnage of 2,422,941. In Great Britain the tonnage launched was 1,265,182 tons, or almost half of the world's total. This was 15,000 tons in excess of 1903, but less than in any of the six previous years. It will be seen that the Mother Country still holds her proud pre-eminence as a builder of ships.

This will more fully appear when the new tonnage of the past year launched by other commercial countries is taken into comparison. In the United States the new tonnage launched was 288,518 tons, a falling off of 143,000 tons as compared with the previous year. Germany launched 212,197 tons and France 81,245 tons. The total for these three great nations was but 581,960 tons, or considerably less than one fourth part of the tonnage launched from British yards alone.

The Register shows a marked tendency toward large steamships. Of twenty-five new vessels all over 6,000 tons each, eight are over 15,000 tons each. Thirteen steamships equipped with turbine engines were launched during the year and other large vessels now in course of construction are

similarly equipped. War vessels totalling 171,000 tons were launched in the United States, which is a greater amount of fighting tonnage than in any country in one year, excepting Great Britain in 1901 when the new war vessels there aggregated 210,000 tons.

If new vessels built in Canada, Australia and other British possessions were added to those built in the British Isles, it would show how far the new tonnage that will carry the British flag will exceed that of any national competitor. The grand total would appear to be considerably more than half the new tonnage set afloat in all the world. Britannia not only rules the waves by the strength of her stupendous navy, but equally the mercantile marine which bears her flag excels in tonnage not only any one but all of her rivals, and all the world besides.

**COMING NAVAL MANOEUVRES.**

The British Admiralty have issued a memorandum in regard to the projected naval manoeuvres for 1905 and 1906. These movements will be conducted upon a very extensive scale, and not confined as heretofore to attack upon and defence of the British Isles. For the sea is all one; British interests and British commerce are everywhere about the world, and therefore the coming evolutions will be of larger proportions than any heretofore undertaken. The conditions presupposed are not those of actual warfare, but of strained relations with some imaginary naval power. The hostile fleets will be represented by various big cruisers which will start on unknown dates from unknown places to represent the movements of the imaginary power.

For the purpose of the proposed operations the enemy will be called the Red Side, while the British fleets in commission will be known collectively as the Blue Side. The Red Side will be represented by three skeleton squadrons as well as by certain detached ships which will move independently in the neighborhood of the great trade routes of the Empire. Two of the Red squadrons will carry out a series of movements in European waters or the West Atlantic while the third will probably make for a more or less remote destination. The business of the Blue Side will be to keep in touch with the ships or squadrons of the Red Side and be ready to act at a moment's notice. This "keeping in touch" will be the work of fast cruisers, while the battleships remain in the vicinity of some central strategic position—a position selected for the purpose of readily receiving information from the scouting cruisers, and at the same time keeping in immediate touch with the central source of diplomatic intelligence.

For the purpose of the movements the "strained relations" existing are supposed to involve danger of war at any moment, which however, Britain is anxious to avoid. She is therefore watching her possible enemy without giving any needless offence. The first task of the Blue cruisers will be to find the fleets or ships of the enemy, which will be no light task. After that comes the harder task of maintaining unbroken touch with the Red fleet or ship they have discovered and also with some one or other of the Blue Commanders in Chief. This may prove impossible, but much may be learned by making the attempt. Practice alone makes perfect. The naval program is published broadcast in advance in time of peace in order that when undertaken neither France, Germany or Russia may imagine that the preparation is being made specially against either of them. The London Times remarks that for the first time in the history of naval manoeuvres the general idea has risen to the full height of Britain's position on the seas. "The sea is all one and wherever the white ensign flies, there during the manoeuvres of 1905 will every man afloat be expected to do his duty."
