Restoring Madame Tussaud's

One of the sights of London, the loss of which has been felt as a tragedy by innumerable visitors, is to be restored next year. In about two months' time the new Madame Tussaud's is to be opened to the public.

Members of the Tussaud family are now busy making models to replace those destroyed in the fire. All those which were then lost are to be replaced by the character and traditions of the old exhibition will be maintained.

One novel feature of the new Madame Tussaud's is that the Chamber of Horrors will be underground, instead of on the level of the streets.

The exhibition has a history which stretches back to the days of the French Revolution, and even before that. Madame Tussaud, who established it in London, was drawing-mistress to the family of the ill-fated Louis XVI.

1. Poultry must be crated fattened. Be sure birds are full grown before crating them and fatten them well before killing.

2. Poultry should be starved for twelve hours before killing.

If you are not familiar with this method it would be best to get an experienced person to teach you otherwise you are likely to spoil your Poultry. 4. Your Poultry must be dry plucked and free of all pin feathers. Also be careful not to tear the birds. These points are very important for otherwise perfect Poultry can easily be damaged in the plucking.

5. If convenient hang the birds for twelve hours after they are plucked to allow them to be thoroughly cooled. It is unnecessary to tie them up with cord before bringing them in to market. Just leave them in the natural shape in which they have cooled while hanging up.

6. Be sure that any blood is removed from the birds' mouths and their feet are clean before packing.

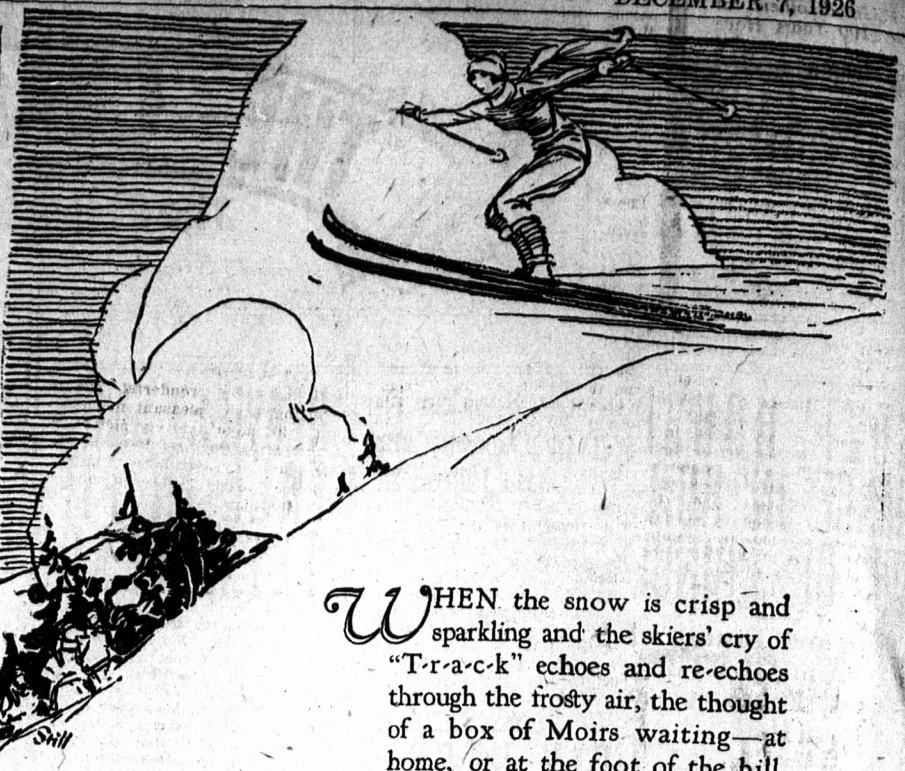
Doris was wearing an exquisite negligee of Gobelins blue, bordered in silver fox, when Hartley's aunt entered the stateroom.

It was chastely a feminine bow which she laid her hand on the knob, and uttered in surprise:

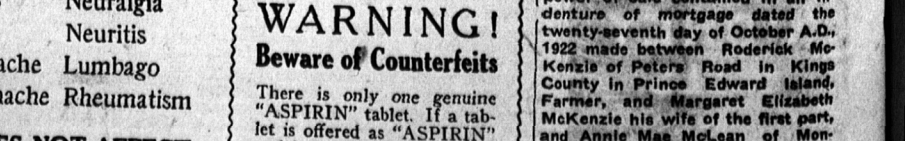
"Why, it's locked!"
