THE sole legal right of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Removal of Ban Re Influenza Epidemic in Country Districts

In consequence of the Governor General having proclaimed Sunday next, the 17th instant, as a day of national Thanksgiving and prayer on the termination of the war, and in order that the people of this Province may have an opportunity of showing their gratitude by participating in same, the ban and restrictions of the Provincial Board of Health closing the Churches and other places of worship in this province during the present Influenza Epidemic is hereby removed, excepting in such localities as in the opinion of the Local Board of Health it is not yet advisable in the public interest to remove the same, the date of removal shall be fixed and acted upon by the Local Board of Health.

The removal of such restrictions shall likewise apply to the Public Schools in this Province excepting in cases as above mentioned.

This Order does not apply to incorporated towns. In such places the removal of restrictions is left entirely in the hands of the Civic Boards of Health.

is now in England, but in a condition that will prevent any more military service. The notice of his death was first seen in the Globe, but the failure of the Government to officially notify the family led them to believe that it was another man of the same name.

A few days ago, when no letters of any kind had been recently received, his wife, Henrietta, formerly Miss Bradley of Vernon River, P. E. I., called on the local Red Cross unit for assistance, and a telegram was sent to Canada. Mrs. McKinnon has since received a letter from Capt. G. D. Kilpatrick, Chaplain of the 42nd Bn Canadian which stated that Private McKinnon was killed by machine gun fire while gallantly advancing with his company in the attack and was buried on the battle field. He is a brother of Joseph McKinnon of the Sergeant Police Div. 4 Boston, Mass.

Sailors' Superstitions. All seafaring men are superstitious, but none is so completely under this influence as the old deep-sea fisherman. He believes in "signs" and omens of all kinds. Nothing would induce a skipper of the old school to sail on a Friday. One intrepid unbeliever who dared to leave the deck of a Grimsby on a Good Friday was holed through the lock-gates by the scandalized populace.

If a man's hat blew overboard while leaving port, many skippers would turn back and delay sailing until the next day. It was an omen that one of the crew would be lost during the trip. This sign, however, became discredited, as wily deckhands, desirous of another day ashore with their wives and families, contracted the habit of going aloft and assisting the wind to foretell disaster.

To speak of pigs aboard a fishing trawler is fatal. Poor catches and split and torn trawls will be the inevitable consequences. Similar misfortunes will result from taking off a hatch cover and laying it on the deck upside down. To kill a "chick," as the fishermen call the small kind of seagulls that follow in the wake of the trawlers, is a most dangerous act, liable to imperil the safety of the ship itself. —Tit-Bits.

The Chrysanthemum. The richly colored chrysanthemum is now treasured by flower lovers because, to use the poet's words, "It winks with joy the floral breach 'twixt waning summer and welcome spring."

There is a common belief that the chrysanthemum originated in Japan, but, like many other good things, it was really borrowed from the Chinese. Switzerland Requires

More Connecting Links

With Friendly Neighbors

THE difficulties in which Switzerland finds herself for lack of proper means of communication with all but the contingent belligerent countries have caused the old but never before seriously considered project of a direct waterway connecting Geneva with Marseilles to be taken up again. Although a further improvement of the Rhine upstream to Basel has been much discussed for many years and a heavy boat traffic to and from the northern Swiss metropolis has been carried on during six out of twelve months, no direct waterway such as the one now under discussion has been actively considered.

The German press emphasizes the fact that a further improvement of the Rhine between Strasbourg and Basel can be finished within five years, and that thenceforth boats of 2,000 tons could reach Basel from Rotterdam during at least ten months of the year. German technical, commercial and financial experts do their best to brand the project of establishing a direct water route from Marseilles via the Rhone to Geneva as utopian. The anxiety of the "unselfish" Teuton can easily be understood because Germany's exports to little Switzerland amounted in 1913 to not less than 520,000,000 marks, or 7 per cent. of the Fatherland's total exports.

On the other hand, the Swiss had a taste of German chicanery before the present world war and of German arrogance and extortion during the last four years. Furthermore, experts figure that an improvement of the Rhine between Lyons and Geneva would be only a little more expensive and much more profitable than the improvement of the Rhine from Strasbourg to Basel. South of Lyons the Rhone is navigable for large boats all the year round, and the river is connected, near its estuary, with Marseilles, the greatest French seaport, through a deep ship canal. While it costs 13.50 francs to ship a ton of grain by rail from Marseilles to Geneva, the freight by boat on the improved Rhone would be only 9.36 francs and could be reduced to 7.37 francs in case the upper Rhone would be canalized. That means the freight would be cheaper from Marseilles to Switzerland than from Rotterdam by nearly 10 per cent.

Plans for connecting Switzerland by a canal with Genoa or Venice, and even with the Atlantic, have been discussed, but dismissed as impracticable because of the prohibitive cost of building and the higher freight rates. Certain commercial Swiss circles, among them the Zurich Chamber of Commerce, favor the improvement of the Rhone and the Rhine in order to create two waterways connecting Switzerland with the sea. But that double project manifestly sprang from the peculiar situation created by the present war, and takes into account conditions which will cease to exist with the defeat of the Hun.
