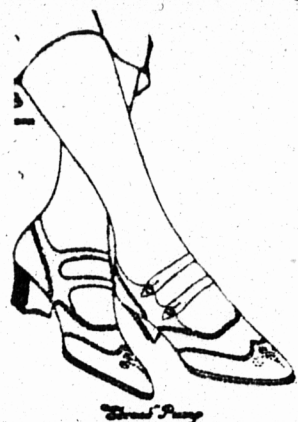

—**BURGLARIES CONTINUE**—Residents of Summerside are wondering just what is wrong with the town, when robbery after robbery can be committed with impunity, no effort apparently being made to catch the thieves. Following the burglarizing of the Enman Pharmacy on Sunday night, the residence of Henry Staver, McGill Street, was broken into on Tuesday night, between 8 and 10 o'clock and a quantity of silverware, jewelry and some money, all the personal property of the housekeeper, was taken. The thieves tried to effect an entrance from the back door of the house, but proving impracticable, a ladder was secured and a window in the north end of the second floor was broken through which the burglars effected an entrance. At the time, the housekeeper and the other occupants of the house were visiting neighbors. Mr. Staver, the owner of the property, which was formerly occupied by H. H. Beery, is spending the winter in Jamaica. This is the twelfth robbery that has been committed in Summerside, with an arrests made.

—**UNIQUE CURIOSITY**—One of the most peculiar-looking game birds ever seen in the province is being exhibited in the store of R. T. Holman, Limited, Summerside. It is a Belgian wild goose, a distant cousin of the Canadian variety, which makes its home in the marshes of Flanders and along the sea front of Belgium. Particularly noticeable is the size of the bird, the length measuring 36 inches from tip of tail to top of head, the bill is long and sharp pointed and the feet seem to be smaller in proportion to the rest of the fowl than those of the Canadian variety. In color the specimen is a slate gray with white markings and the breast is nearly all white. This Belgian goose was shot at Hamilton, (P. E. I.) last fall by Norman Ferguson and has been positively identified by many war veterans as a typical specimen of the wild geese that are native to Belgium and Flanders. "It came a long distance to get shot. I tell you that for me," said Vital Legere, when looking at this specimen.

Alberton News

The regular meeting of the Town Council took place last night in the I.O.O.F. Hall, Mayor Burke presiding. There was considerable new matter before the Council, and some appointments. Mr. John T. Profit and J. W. Waugh were appointed Town Assessors at a salary of \$500 each per annum. Mr. P. S. Fielding was re-appointed Town Clerk at a salary of \$100.00 per annum. It was decided after some discussion that the Town should still have a policeman, and the Town Clerk was authorized to receive tenders for this position at his office until 6 o'clock on March 25th. Another matter was the adoption of a resolution to the effect that as the wharves of Alberton need some repair and as the services of a dredge are badly needed, that a copy of such resolution should be immediately forwarded to the Minister of Public Works, as well as to our representatives in the Commons and Senate.

Mr. F. E. Rogers, newly-elected Councilor, spoke at some length on this question, and in a very clear exposition of the necessity of such a work, showed that he has added considerable strength and of fidelity to the Council Board. A committee, consisting of Councilors Rogers and MacBeth was appointed to visit upon Magistrate Tanton, with the object of inducing him to agree to his reappointment. A great deal of dissatisfaction was expressed by the various Councilors with the manner in which the electric light system has been conducted the past few months. As the representative of the electric plant was present at the meeting, the Council took the opportunity strongly intimating to him their intention of making a substantial cut in the rates unless a better light service was forthcoming at once.

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A PADRE IN THE GREAT WAR

They said I looked worn out. A good dish of ham and eggs and a cup of strong tea at that time were most refreshing, and when I had finished eating, seeing a copy of the Oxford Book of Verse on the table, I began to read it to them, and finally, and quite naturally, found myself later on, about one a. m. reciting my own poems. It was most interesting meeting another set of men. The barn, which was kept as a prison for Germans, was large and commodious. As we took only five or six prisoners at that time it was more than sufficient for the purpose. The officer told me that, the reason so few prisoners turned up was that the Canadians got tired of their charges before they arrived at the prison, and only handed over a few souvenirs. I really think the Highlanders believed it. The Glasgow, a company of Argyle, were now moved away and were sent to Sutherland Highlands. The tables were now turned, for as I had kept on inhabiting the large room with the three heaps of straw in it, the two officers who came "to take over" asked my permission to make their billet in the prison.

AN EVENING SERVICE

In the meantime the fighting in the trenches was very fierce. I spent my days in parish visiting and my night at the various dressing stations. The batteries of artillery were in the country.

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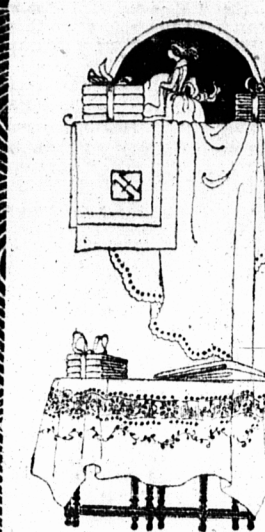
