FM Extension Plans Delayed By Shortages

OTTAWA, Aug. 30 — (CP) — A shortage of equipment is delaying OBC plans for the expansion of regular and frequency modulation broadcasting services, Dr. Augustin Frigon, general manager of the OBC, said today.

The plans called for the establishment of FM transmitters at Winnipeg and Vancouver, but equipment could not yet be obtained to carry out the projects.

Dr. Frigon said the Vancouver transmitter could be established as soon as equipment became available, but a number of matters would have to be cleared up before work could start in Winnipeg. The whole program of expansion would be discussed at next month's meeting of the Board of Governors.

He said that the OBC has not yet heard what policy members of the American Federation of Musicians plan to adopt with respect to FM broadcasting in Canada. However, the fact that the policy was still unknown had nothing to do with the delay. In the building of the new FM transmitters.

He said that in the United States the Federation would not permit the same program which is being broadcast simultaneously from an FM station. The Federation regarded FM as a separate system from AM and ruled that its members were entitled to pay for both FM and AM broadcasts.

Walter Murdoch of Toronto, Canadian representative of the Federation, indicated before the radio committee of the Commons during the recent session that a somewhat similar policy would be followed in Canada.

When asked what the Federation's views with respect to FM broadcasting in Canada, he said the matter was under consideration.

Canada's policy so far has been to grant licenses for FM broadcasting, a system under which static is eliminated and high fidelity reception provided, to holders of AM licenses. Licenses are granted on the understanding that all broadcasts will go out over both FM and AM transmitters.

The OBC now is operating FM stations in Montreal and Toronto and some private stations have also been granted. So far few FM receiving sets have reached the Canadian market but some of them now are making their appearance. An ordinary receiving set will not pick up FM broadcasts, but a more expensive set to pick up both FM and AM programs.

Armed Forces Of U. S. Have Shrunk Greatly

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 — (CP) — In the face of the unfriendly and at times scornful attitude of the Soviet Union and its satellites and the avowed American policy of helping potential victims to ward off Communist conquest, the armed forces of the United States have shrunk to an alarming state of weakness.

Probably never before in peace time has there been so much talk of large scale war, yet the striking power of the United States — greatest of any country in history two years ago — has dwindled to a mere shadow of what it was.

This is not news and the fact that a fighting force of around 12,000,000 of two years ago has been reduced to less than 1,500,000 is perhaps natural for a peace-loving country.

Of greatest concern to those who bear the responsibility of defence — and offence if that becomes necessary — is the weakness of the Air Force.

When the war ended the United States had an Air Force of 23,000 men and almost unlimited aircraft. Today the personnel has shrunk to a little more than 300,000 and the aircraft have disappeared with similar speed.

The Army strength, which at its wartime peak had 8,300,000 men and 900,000 officers, has dwindled to about 850,000 men and 130,000 officers. Naval personnel has shrunk to 500,000 officers and men.

A number of factors have contributed to this swift dismantling of the country's fighting forces before the war is officially over and in the face of persistent signs that a third world war may be in the making.

There was the natural inclination to get war personnel back as quickly as possible to the normal business of manning the country's hugely expanded industrial system.

Politics, too, played a large part in the demobilization and the reduction of appropriations for maintaining the fighting establishments.

With the United Kingdom weakened and shaky, the United States alone is in a position to speak with authority in reply to Russia.

That authority will be powerful or insubstantial according to the decisions that must be taken shortly — whether to back United States foreign policies with unlimited striking power or to depend upon diplomacy and the hope that once again, if necessary, there will be time to arm if another world conflict erupts.

LIQUOR EDUCATION MAINLY FOR YOUTH

VICTORIA, Aug. 30 — (CP) — British Columbia has set up a program of temperance education implementing legislation passed at the last session of the provincial house.

The act provides funds to be expended under the direction of the minister of education for a temperance program in schools and in young peoples' groups.

This program, under the direction of the former chief school inspector, H.L. Campbell, will educate youth through regular school curricula, lectures, films, broadcasts and panel discussions.

Education Minister G.M. Weir says consensus is that the emphasis should be on mental hygiene designed to appeal to the younger generation.

Dr. Weir says most authorities agree the objectives adopted by Yale University School for studies in alcoholism are the most acceptable and are, in effect, the same as those stated by London University, England.

Their objectives are: To convey a factual knowledge of alcoholic beverages in such a way that it will be presented to the pupil in an impersonal manner, take cognizance of the pupil's age, grade and interest level.
