VALUED SOUVENIR.—Col. Moore has received a much valued war souvenir in the shape of a German gas mask, bearing the name of its original wearer, Felix Kauffmann. The mask, although showing signs of considerable usage, is in good condition and would probably be of use still if available to a German. It is enclosed in a tin case, which is worn slung over the shoulder and weighing nearly two pounds, quite an addition to the already heavy equipment of the soldier. It is entirely different from the mask used by the British soldier, the latter being much lighter and probably equally effective. Col. Moore received it from Gunner Harold Moore of No. 2 Siege Battery, and although he never expects to use it, he will keep it as a valued souvenir of the war. The mask may be seen in the window of Messrs. Black & Co., Sunnyside.

SOLDIER'S LETTER

The following letter was received by Mrs. Catherine Burke, Malpeque, regarding her son Charles Edgar, who was reported dangerously ill on June 26th, Pte. Burke, left the Island in May, 1917, was drafted to the 26th Battalion in France and spent eleven months there before being wounded.

Dear Mrs. Burke:

I am sending you a few lines to let you know that your son, C. E. Burke was admitted here on June 28th, and as his right hand is damaged I'm writing a few lines to you for him. He got hit with shrapnel and is getting along real fine, though he got wounded in his legs and arm, but nothing very serious, and with good luck he should be in Canada in three months time, maybe sooner, so you have no cause to worry at all. Since I've been in the hospital I've learned that we have a real fine lot

of doctors and sisters, who do their best for every body, so you can rest assured that he will be alright and have every comfort.
