OUTBREAK IN UNIT.—A letter from an officer of the St. Francis Xavier Unit, stationed in England, and in charge of the Canadian Military Hospital at Bramshot, says fifteen members of the staff and fifty patients were under quarantine for diphtheria.

TROOPS FOR ST. JOHN.—The St. John Globe says: Latest advice in regard to accommodation for overseas units here is to the effect that plans have been completed which will tax, for a considerable period, all housing facilities in the city. Not only will quarters in the city proper be filled, but Partridge Island will also be given a capacity allotment of soldiers. The 165th and 198th are now quartered at St. John.

OLD TIME SNOW STORM.—Prince Edward Island yesterday was in the grip of a north-easter, somewhat after the old time pattern. The snow started to fall between five and six o'clock on the previous evening and continued all night and throughout yesterday only abating about six o'clock last evening. No train moved in any direction on the P. E. I. R. on account of the storm, and there was no crossing between the Island and Mainland. Owing to the high wind prevailing the snow was not as deep as might have been expected. The greatest amount of snow fell in the western part of the province. On account of the storm the schools in Charlottetown did not hold session yesterday.

PROFITABLE ADDRESS.—A very interesting address on "Potato Culture" given by Mr. P. Brodie before the members of Cornwall Institute, was the event, on the evening of February 28th. Mr. Brodie who has been a successful exhibitor, both at home and at the maritime fair, was in fine form and gave a very clear and thorough explanation of this most important subject, from the preparation of the soil to the proper selection of seed, as well as the cultivation during growth of final harvesting. Many questions were put and most satisfactorily answered. At the close, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Brodie, by the president, Mr. H. W. Mallett. This is one of a series of addresses, this Institute is to have during the ensuing months.

POPULATION OF WALLACHIA FORCED TO WORK FOR GERMANS (Canadian Press Despatch).

ROUMANIAN HEADQUARTERS, March 4.—A Rumanian officer left behind at Wallachia succeeded in passing the German line, and brought interesting information. The whole civil population between the ages of 18 and 42, he says, is compelled to work for the enemy. The Germans have requisitioned everything, leaving the population hardly enough to eat.

NO EMBARGO ON POTATOES

OTTAWA, March 2.—Members of the Cabinet declare that there is no truth in the story published today to the effect that the Government would put an embargo on the export of potatoes. The question has not yet been considered by the Department of Agriculture. It is stated that there is no serious shortage of potatoes in Canada. The present shortage is local, rather than general, and attributed to the transportation tie-up of last month. In a few weeks, as soon as available supplies in Western Canada and in the Maritime Provinces can be moved by freight, it is predicted that the famine at some points in central Canada will be relieved, and prices will drop to something like normal.
