charges made against him in the press he might have very little time for anything else. He then read the correspondence between himself and G. T. Clarkson, Home Bank liquidator.

Mr. Murdock said that he would add nothing further but would leave the matter in the hands of the House.

Premier Offers Investigation Premier McKenzie King agreed with Mr. Porter as to the necessity of maintaining the honor and dignity of parliament and especially of Ministers of the Crown.

Mr. Porter had said that he brought his motion on the strength of certain information which had come to him. Now that he had received further information from the Minister involved, perhaps Mr. Porter would not consider it necessary to press his motion to a vote.

Parliamentary inquiry was not necessary in the light of the fact that a Royal Commission was now investigating the Home Bank's affairs and was competent to deal with such charges as were contained in the motion.

It, however, any member of the House felt that the motion should go to a vote, and the house decided an investigation by parliament was necessary, then the government was prepared to go through with it.

Hon. Mr. Meighan Urges Investigation Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighan said that this debate was one in which nobody could indulge with any great pleasure.

that may have occurred will be corrected and it is safe to say that by that time everybody will be desirous of being associated with an organization, achieving such splendid and far-reaching results.

It should be emphasized that assistance and co-operation NOW, in helping along the Association while it is still struggling to get fairly started, is of infinitely more value than any proffered help after the movement is well under way.

When it will not require such belated recognition. Now is the time to help the Tourist Movement in Prince Edward Island by advice and kindly criticism if necessary, by boosting the organization upon every opportunity, by freely sending in information regarding available places where tourists can be accommodated, and last, but by no means least, by financial aid.

No member of the Association is receiving one dollar for any work done. Busy men are sacrificing time and money to the work, all the funds being devoted to the one vital thing—publicity.

The preparation of the folders and booklet for distribution, the selection of the newspapers and magazines and the accumulation of necessary information regarding the Island's advantages—all this is being done gratuitously by people who are very deeply interested because they know the returns will be more than abundant, and will benefit, directly or indirectly, every man, woman and child in the Province.

This is how the members of the Association look upon their work. Surely it is not too much to ask of the people generally a sympathetic interest in the movement and a ready response to any enquiries that might be made through the Association?

What the Movement Means In an address before the members of the Provincial Legislature during the past session, Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault, president of the Association, outlined very fully the aims of the organization and the results which he felt confident would ultimately accrue from well placed advertising backed by the various working committees of the Association and the people generally.

He called upon the members of the Legislature, as leaders in their communities, to assist the movement by voice and example. He explained that in addition to the finance and publicity committees, the latter of which is directly concerned with the preparation and distributing of advertising matter, there are the housing committee, provided to look after the comfort of tourists on their arrival here, and the entertainment committee, which is engaged in making provision for attractions of various kinds, including all kinds of but-dor sports, particularly fishing and boating.

These committees are now busy preparing for the summer's activities. The plan of this year's advertising was also outlined by Mr. Justice Arsenault. He explained that an appropriation is being received from the Canadian National Railways, as well as from the Provincial and Federal Governments, and that the three Maritime Provinces will advertise jointly Prince Edward Island paying in proportion of one to five, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia each contributing in proportion of two to five.

In this way each province receives the benefit of the full advertising. The advertisements will run in newspapers of Montreal, Toronto, Boston, Detroit and New York also in the Maple Leaf Magazine and in the Canadian National Railways Magazine, the special bulletins being distributed through tourist bureaus and hotels and through personal channels.

As already stated, this campaign has only been launched within the past few days but has already secured desirable results in the way of interested inquiries. The tourist traffic will not begin until about the 1st of July and in the meantime no doubt many more enquiries will be received. People who have received questionnaires are requested, if they have not done so, to send these in at once.

The housing committee cannot be blamed for overlooking desirable places when no information has been forwarded about them. The Association is recommending to tourists only those places which it feels confident will be able to give accommodation and the information it receives must be accurate and definite.

Individual Efforts, Needed The hospitality of the people of Prince Edward Island is proverbial. It has been remarked and commented upon by visitors to our shores in other years and there is no doubt that when tourists arrive this summer they will receive the same courteous treatment. But the Tourist Association is asking just one thing more—THE CO-OPERATION OF THE PEOPLE OF THE PROVINCE NOW! This is necessary in order to make adequate provision for these visitors.

This year a very large increase cannot reasonably be expected, but every subsequent year will show a tremendous increase. Outside of Charlottetown and Summerside practically no financial assistance has been given, and yet the great majority of tourists are not coming here to see Charlottetown and Summerside.

The advertisement which has already attracted such attention in the Montreal paper makes no allusion to these centres—it simply refers to the island generally as a desirable summer haven to the lazier in spirit, the wearied in body.

In addition to the beautiful folders prepared by the Tourist Association, individual booklets have been prepared by progressive business men who see the great opportunity ahead. Two of these, one advertising Beach Grove Inn and the other "Souris by the Sea," prepared by the management of the Cox Hotel, Souris, are being distributed by the Association along with its own literature.

This is an illustration of the fact that anything tending to boost the island will meet with the warm support of the Tourist Association. This generous spirit is the only one through which success in this line can be achieved. Every letter of enquiry that comes to the Association means that one more family is interested in Prince Edward Island, and it matters not in what part of the Province they spend their time and money when they reach here—they will go back and tell their friends they have been on a visit to "the island."
