## A COMPLAINT FROM ALBERTA.

A complaint reaches The Guardian from a valued subscriber in Alberta that some of our editorial references to the winter climate of the Northwest are, as he says, misleading. The complaint comes from one who has lived in Prince Edward Island and has now lived five years in Alberta. He asks, "Can the cattle and horses on the noble little Isle gain a living all winter as thousands do on the western prairies?" Certainly not. Nor is the fine climate of southern Alberta typical of what is commonly spoken of here as the Northwest.

We are by no means hostile to the Prairie country. Having visited it years ago we were greatly impressed with its fertility and Promise. We are pleased to read of its more recent rapid growth and development. We believe a great future awaits the Provinces there. In a country so vast there is a great range of temperature and other conditions. The extreme cold of some sections, the scarcity and cost of fuel and the bad water are undoubted drawbacks.

In any case we cannot build up the Dominion by depopulating one section to populate another. But if our Island people will leave their native land we would advise them to go to the Canadian West. It is not our business to advertise the new Provinces. The Government, the railways and speculators, the holders of town lots, are doing that abundantly to their own profit. It pays the railways and the speculators to have people to travel thither whether they stay or return.

## THE WINTER TIME TABLE.

The winter time table on the railway which is timed to take effect on Monday next while satisfactory in many respects is in the nature of things unsatisfactory to Charlottetown and to persons residing along the western line and wishing to do business in this city. This is a large class, good patrons of the railway, and it is of the utmost importance for the business of the road, the convenience of these persons and for our merchant here that they should be well accommodated. As the trains are scheduled to run these persons cannot come to the city and transact a reasonable amount of business without staying over night in this city.

True they will have two and a half hours in the city on three days of the week, between the hour of arrival and departure if the incoming trains are on time. We all know how uncertain and often how impossible that is the midwinter season. Trains will be late from day to day. It

takes time to tramp or drive from the station to the business centre and back again, so that practically the train arrangements as set down impose the necessity of taking two days for the trip and staying over night in town. This would be hard on business and travel alike. The railway must lose heavily, legitimate business be restricted and great inconvenience, delay and cost imposed on those desiring to come to the city from the west.

One remedy suggested is to have the train from Cape Traverse, on arriving at Emerald, to come to this city and return daily. This would go far to obviate the difficulty, and is the easiest way out. At any rate something should be done in this or another way to give accommodation to the legitimate business of the city and its patrons between here and Summerside.

We trust the Superintendent will give his most favorable attention to the matter. The new time table as it will create more or less a friction. The remedy proposed would go far to meet it and at moderate cost which would probably be repaid to the railway in traffic that would otherwise be lost.

We think it would be well for our merchant and citizens to talk over the matter with the Superintendent, bearing in mind at the same time that he is carrying out the general policy of re-encumbrance laid down by the Department, and that it is extremely difficult to curtail expenses and give all the trains which the people would like to have.

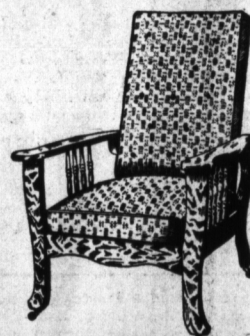
