IN MEMORIAM
F. F. HOLLAND
 It was with feelings of profound sorrow and regret that the people of Tryon and vicinity learned of the death of one of the old land marks in the person of Mr. F. F. Holland, the subject of this sketch was the son of the late Samuel Holland, and was born in Tryon, ninety years ago. He emigrated to the United States in the early days, where he was engaged in the printing business. He returned to his native province when yet a young man where he engaged in farming, starting under adverse circumstances, but by industry and thrift he acquired a valuable estate of over three hundred acres. He was truly a son of the soil, a great student of nature. He loved the great outdoors. Endowed with a fine physique, he was when a young man an athlete of no mean order, and despite his advanced age, up to the last few years he still retained that erect stature and courtly bearing that was characteristic of him in middle life. His methods were greatly in advance of the times in which he lived. His fine herds of cattle and large well cultivated fields were an object lesson to his neighbors and an inspiration to all who passed that way. One of the most charitable of men, none were ever turned away from his door hungry or empty handed. There are many who can attest to his hospitality and the many social evenings spent in his comfortable home. A great reader, able to converse intelligently on any subject made him an admirable host. Possessed with a keen sense of humor, his reminiscences of the olden times made him much sought after at all social functions. His demise severs a link with by gone days and marks the passing of a kindly, courteous gentleman of the old school, whose place in the community will not soon be filled. Although always a very busy man anything that had for its object the advancement or uplift of the community received his hearty support and co-operation, always to be found arrayed on the side of right, he was never known to be guilty of a mean action or to make an unkind or uncharitable remark about any one. He leaves behind him a record of industry, honesty, and integrity that will be cherished by his family, his neighbors and his friends after all earthly monuments have perished to decay. TRAVELLERS ELECT OFFICERS

HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—The Maritime Commercial Travellers' Association held their annual meeting in the Board of Trade rooms Thursday evening, when officers were elected and considerable business was transacted and discussed. Mr. George D. Ellis of St. John, was elected President, and other officers are as follows: Vice-President, J. W. Gordon; for New Brunswick, M. H. Dunlop; for Prince Edward Island, A. A. Alley. The directors for Nova Scotia were G. A. Faulkner; J. J. Harris, H. E. Pyke, G. W. Graham; F. W. Connell, J. W. Longgeran, L. M. Owens; R. G. Schofield, H. W. Spear.
 The past year has been an exceedingly prosperous one for the Association. About \$18000 was added to the funds, making a total to the credit of the Association of \$197,000. Among matters discussed, and which will be taken up vigorously by the members of the Association were the excessive charges by hotels throughout the Province. The members of the Association considered it exceedingly unfair that war time rates should still apply. They will also press for a law of registration and inspection of hotels, in three Provinces, such law to be enacted

through the Legislatures of the respective Provinces.
 One of the matters which has been causing a great deal of irritation to the commercial men is the Government income tax upon the extra daily allowance which commercial travellers are allowed when on the road away from home. The method of the Government has been to apply the income tax to this extra payment, whereas the payment is to cover extra expense which commercial men are put by being away from home, and is not, they contend an increase of income.

"Listening Ear" of Women's Societies

TORONTO, Dec. 10.—"I can't do that shy, afraid-to-look-up stuff, but I shall never forget that I do, in a measure, represent all the women of Canada and what I do will strengthen or weaken their cause." This statement was made today by Miss Agnes MacPhail, representative-elect for Southwest Grey in the House of Commons and the first woman to sit in a Canadian Parliament.
 "My chief aspiration is to be in Ottawa just what I am here. I want really to represent the people who are sending me and of whom I am one. In addition to that I want to learn French.
 "Bodies of nationally organized women, such as the national council and others, have for many years done good work in bringing to the attention of the legislative bodies needed reforms. They have only been able to go so far. It is my hope that I can be listening ear of all such women's bodies and assist them in presenting their case to the House. I do not know that I can accomplish much, and at first I know I can only keep quiet and listen and learn, but I will do my best."
 Miss MacPhail attributes her election wholly to the education of the electorate, which has been carried on almost entirely by the local workers of the constituency, mainly the men, but with a few women as well. Forty seven meetings were held

RECEPTION TO MR. FIELDING
 HALIFAX, Dec. 10.—In the House of Assembly which knew him as a provincial Premier over twenty-five years ago, Hon. W. S. Fielding, member elect for Shelburne-Queens last night was given an enthusiastic reception by the members of the Provincial Government, men and women electors of Halifax and the Liberal stalwarts from various parts of Nova Scotia. Premier Murray in calling upon Mr. Fielding for a speech said the eyes of all Canada rested upon him during the election campaign and his victory was a great thing for the whole country. Mr. Fielding, after dwelling on the greatness of the Liberal victory in the east said the task before the new government called for sympathy rather than congratulations. He doubted if in any country with so small a population there were such stupendous problems to solve. Under the best conditions Canada had problems of settlement, racial and religious differences, and every problem accentuated by the gravity of the present situation. It would be necessary for her people to support the government in all policy of retrenchment and help to keep the country from bankruptcy.

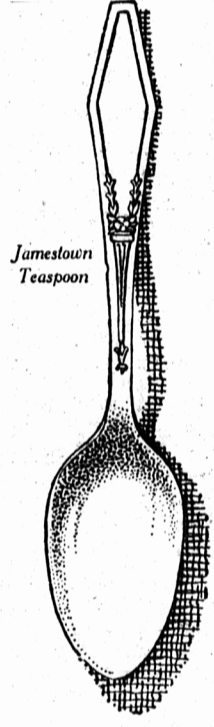
