

MONCTON HOTEL PROBLEMS SENT TO JAIL

MONCTON, N. B., May 1.—Mrs. Margaret Wallace, proprietress of the American Hotel, was yesterday sentenced to three months in jail without the option of a fine for selling liquor, a third offence. The seizure of liquor was made yesterday afternoon. She pleaded guilty to a charge of keeping liquor for sale and was fined \$50 and costs.

A TERRIFYING SPECTACLE.

HONG KONG, May 1.—The Standard Oil Company's plant is in full blaze. Seven huge tanks, containing more than seven million gallons of oil, are burning furiously. The spectacle is terrifying yet magnificent. Four hundred troops of the Indian Army have been called out in an endeavor to circumscribe the blaze. They have succeeded in saving the entire stock of benzine.

CANADIAN NORTHERN SETTLEMENT REACHED

(From Our Own Reporter). OTTAWA, May 2.—The settlement among the Conservatives members with regard to the settlement of the Canadian Northern situation is one of confidence in the Government and a belief that the agreement which has been reached is the most businesslike settlement possible of what is admittedly a most difficult situation. The resolutions will likely be before the House next week and a hint of the debate that is to come was given today when Sir Wilfred Laurier rose in the House and asked for the bringing down of certain information which he desired to have before the debate began. He was told that it would be available at once. The leader of the Opposition desired particularly to have a copy of the Trust Deed and copies of all the contracts for unfinished portions of the railway system. Outside of Messrs Bennett and Nichol the Conservatives are unanimous in support of the agreement. An attempt on the part of the Liberal press to make it appear that there is dissension in the party over the question has signally failed for the members have denied this in the House. Yesterday half a dozen Ontario members denied in most emphatic terms statements appearing in the Globe that they were against the terms of the agreement and today Mr. Claude MacDonell of West Toronto made a similar denial as far as he was concerned. It is not yet certain that Mr. Bennett may not be certain that Mr. Bennett may not be certain in support of the resolution if certain safeguards which he deems necessary are inserted. It is understood that the Liberals have named a committee of members who will consider the agreement carefully. This action indicates that there is no unanimous spirit in open hostility to the terms which have been arrived at.
