THE MURDER CASE.

Coroner Johnson and the jury who have been investigating the awful circumstances of the death of Harriet Warren appear to have made a most searching and painstaking investigation, sitting night after night and summoning before them every person who could possibly throw light upon the dark tragedy. There were several unusual features connected with the inquiry. One was the excitement of the public and the pressure upon the coroner. The coroner's duty is to inquire into the cause of death and to return a verdict. In any case the names of the witnesses and the general purport of their testimony seems to have transpired from day to day. Little of real secrecy was maintained. The exclusion of the public during the examination of witnesses was certainly more defensible than during the summing up and charge of the coroner. The admission of a few favored citizens at some of the sittings while the general public was excluded was altogether unwarranted and censurable. Another unusual feature of the inquiry was found in the fact that the jury were unable at first to agree upon any verdict and were taken before the Chief Justice

for further instructions. This ought not to have been necessary. The coroner ought to have instructed them in the obvious duty and saved the necessity of carrying their unfinished work before the Supreme Court. This incident is one not likely to be repeated here. The finding of wilful murder without naming any person as guilty of the crime seems to be a reasonable outcome of the facts as disclosed by the inquiry. Otherwise (than as above pointed out the coroner and jury appear to have performed an arduous duty in a painstaking manner, at much personal sacrifice of time and convenience. Seldom if ever in this city has a coroner's inquest been so prolonged and more trying. If it has failed to clear point out the criminal, that was because of the strange and inscrutable circumstances surrounding the tragedy. Much good work has been done which will doubtless greatly aid the officers of the crown in the further investigation now to be entered upon.

It has recently transpired that Japan some months ago lost one of her splendid battleships by contact with a Russian mine. The loss was concealed so long as possible but is now admitted. This event but four Japanese battleships remain in the Pacific to serious possibilities when the Russian Baltic fleet shall reach the East, if necessary.

According to the Scientific American it is expected to reach a speed of 150 miles an hour in the tests about to be made on an electric railway near Berlin. Already a speed of over 130 miles an hour has been made on an electric road in Germany. The expected speed of two and a half miles a minute would be sufficient to circle the earth at the equator in less than seven days if it were possible to glide the earth with a pair of rails.
