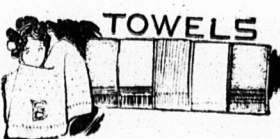

BRITISH CATTLE MARKET

A better trade in Canadian cattle is reported from Glasgow, 359 head of Ontario steers, sold from 10 3/4c to 11 3/4c, 344 to 6 1/4c, 140 alive, Western cattle ranged from 9 1/2c to 10 1/2c, 60 to 7 1/2c, Ontario bulls 6 1/2c to 7 1/2c, 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c. United States Steers 11 1/2c to 11 3/4c, 60 lb. London and Liverpool cables delayed.

The following shipments were filled through Montreal during last week for export to Great Britain: For S. S. Lakonia, St. John's to Glasgow, 435 cattle. For S. S. Manchester Importer, Halifax to Liverpool 241 cattle.

Consider Plan For Betterment Of All Europe

PARIS, Jan. 5.—Louis Loucheur, the French Minister of Liberated Regions, presided over a meeting held at the foreign office this afternoon attended by British, Italian, Belgian and French financiers and business men, to discuss the European economic situation as an outgrowth of the recent discussion of the situation in London by Premier Lloyd George, Premier Briand and others.

In the morning, the French delegation had a preliminary exchange of views with Sir Laming Wrothamston-Evans and the other members of the British delegation over the British memoranda on the economic situation.

The conference adjourned at eight o'clock in the evening. No communication was issued, but it is understood that Russia was the main subject of discussion. It is declared that it was conceded that a stable financial situation must be guaranteed in that country in order to secure a fitting return for capital invested and that private property and private enterprise must be recognized by law.

Fire Threatened Destruction Of Liverpool, N. S.

LIVERPOOL, N. S., Jan. 5. Fanned by a northerly gale, fire which destroyed the Seldon Block on Main St., threatened for a time to wipe out most of this town. Much difficulty was experienced by the firemen getting their apparatus through the snow drift streets, and only here and there spreading through the fire of the town. The buildings on the block and the four ten-story structures carried about \$10,000 insurance.

Canadian Services

LONDON, Jan. 2. Southampton, which will become familiar to traveling Canadians as the new base for the Canadian Pacific and Cunard steamship services, has decided to improve its port at a cost of thousands of pounds. Negotiations are proceeding for the purchase of the world's largest floating dock, and a dredging scheme has been approved which will allow the largest Cunard and White Star liners to approach and leave the docks without difficulty.

Purness, Whyte & Company, Limited, according to the London press today, are inaugurating a new service to the Pacific coast of Canada. The business, which was initiated experimentally a short time ago, is said to be developing satisfactorily.

Six Men Rescued Off Grand Banks

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—News of the rescue of the crew from the 155-ton French schooner Reine Des Mores, of Dunkirk, St. Pierre, off the Grand Banks of New York, was received by wireless here today. The message came from Captain A. B. Randall, of the United States Lines steamship Hudson.

The wireless message, after detailing the position of the schooner from which the men were rescued, said: "Non, rescued crew of six, French schooner Reine Des Mores, of Dunkirk, St. Pierre, Dec. 27 for Bordeaux, cargo fish. Captain Jean Marie Labise washed overboard, Dec. 28."

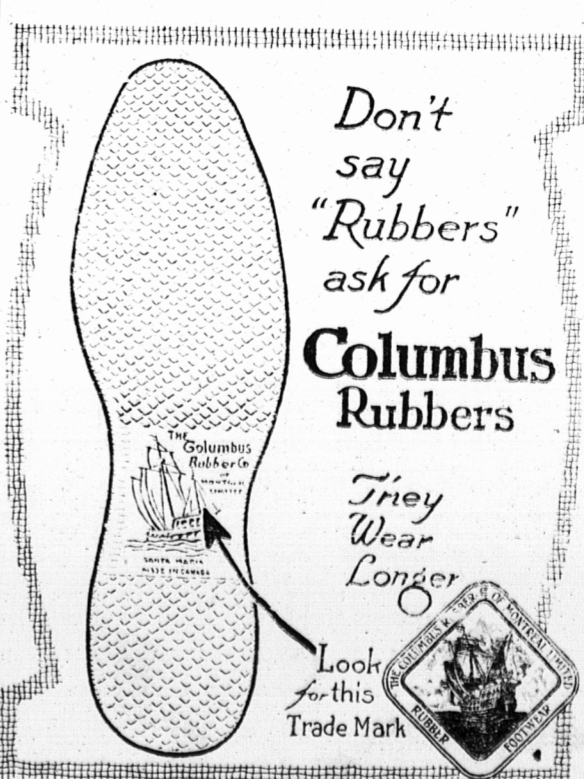
All that medical skill and the care and love of a devoted mother could do was done for him but it was in vain.
