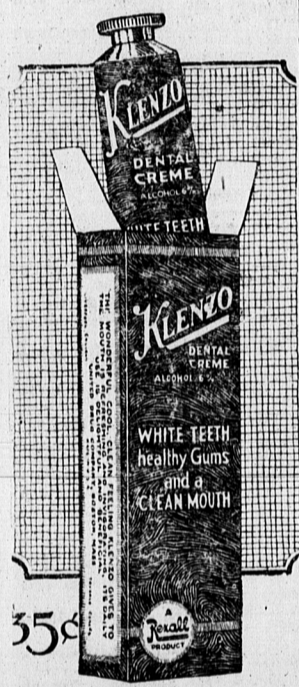

figures of the British Board of Trade for the first nine months of this year show that the Dominions and Colonies purchased more than the whole of Europe or of the United States. South America, Japan and China together, and that the value of Great Britain's exports to the overseas Dominions and other parts of the British Empire reached in the same nine months the enormous total of 246,323,000 pounds.

On the other hand the exports of the British Dominions to Great Britain, even when competing freely and on equal terms with foreign countries, exceed largely those of any other country. There can be no doubt or question in view of these facts that if the Mother Country and the British Dominions were all parts of the world should prefer each other's products when applying their respective needs, the prosperity of the Empire as a whole, and of each individual member of it, will be greatly promoted.

At the same time there need be no breach of friendly relations with foreign countries. As the great republic prefers, in a practical way, every one of the United States, while it protects each and all against the too free use of United States markets by foreigners, and is yet on the most friendly terms possible with Great Britain and other foreign nations, so will the British Empire by preferring its own Dominions and Colonies be the more highly respected, and so will it be supplied with all that it needs of the products of other nations, even while it promotes industry and prosperity in every part of the British commonwealth.

The fact that the government of Great Britain has adopted the resolutions of the Economic Conference held in London last year, and has decided to restore the McKenna duties is being hailed with satisfaction alike in the Mother Country and in all the Dominions that are favourably affected. A lately published announcement that the Cunard Line will next year double the number of its steamships plying between Great Britain and Canada is significant.

The extent and splendour of the Empire exhibition held at Wembley the wonder of visitors from all parts of the world and from all parts of the Mother Country. The effect upon trade and industry of the Empire, encouraged and preferred by all the British governments and peoples, cannot be estimated. It is to be hoped that there will be no recalcitrant Dominions. As Mr. Baldwin remarked, the unity of the Empire is essential.

The result of the elections in the United States shows that the electors there are determined to maintain the policy, under which they have become the wealthiest people in the world and are determined also to contend against the great National evil of intemperance. In Mr. Collidge they have a President whose moderation and prudence has been demonstrated. Murders, robberies and other outrages in Mexico have alienated the friendship of Great Britain, which is no longer represented at the Mexican capital. But South American, in all its parts, has been peaceful and friendly. The visit of the Prince of Wales to Argentina arranged to take place next summer will, without doubt, tend to cement friendships between all the British countries and that enterprising nation of the South. Japan was again disturbed by earthquakes, and her people have been busily engaged in repairing the damage. In South Africa and Rhodesia improvement in every direction has been the order of the day; and the news that many thousands of the natives have become Christians, and are being Christianized, is reassuring. China has been afflicted by internecine war the end of which is not yet, and India has been troubled by political agitators. In Turkey there has been comparative quietude throughout the year. But a political and religious revolution in Arabia have been followed by troubles that have greatly disturbed the followers of Mahomed. Russia remains in control of the Soviets, though Lenin has passed away and Trotsky's power has been

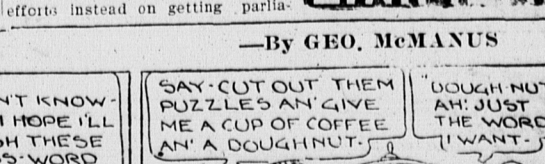
