EDUCATION: WHAT DOES P. E. I. NEED?

Sir—Ever since I can remember there has been wailing and gnashing of teeth over the appalling fluctuation and depopulation of P. E. Island.

The province is the richest per capita in the Dominion, yet so many leave home.

I shall not try to solve this problem yet I do wish to bring before the P. E. Island Teachers' Association, the question of higher salaries.

Surely a great point must find itself in lack of realization and thus into lack of stimulation.

The professors at Prince of Wales College are paid less than an experienced rural school teacher in our neighboring country, and you will not find many of these rural school teachers married.

Scores of teachers are able to save twice as much a year as the public teachers yearly salary on P. E. I.

The government allowance is out of all proportion to actual service rendered.

The fault does not border on supplementary allowances from the school district.

Were the government allowance, per teacher, raised three hundred dollars a year, that might result in a fair inducement to the ambitious, but even then the salaries would not favourably compare with well-paid teachers in neighboring provinces in New England States.

The average salary of \$1200—\$5,000 is not excessive for grade teachers and high school principals. This salary is the every day occurrence elsewhere in places for poorer per capita, then, why out of the question here? Perhaps because there has not been enough pressure or stimulation or stress placed upon education and salaries.

I hope that the P. E. I. Teachers' Association will come forward to gain for their supporters what each deserves in yearly stipend.
