ACT PROVES BENEFIT TO MAPLE INDUSTRY

The Maple Sugar Industry Act is proving a real benefit to the industry according to a statement issued by the Hon. Robert Weir, Minister of Agriculture. Not only has there been a decided restriction of competition by imitation products, which must now be clearly defined as such, but there has also been a marked increase in the use of pure maple products, particularly in the confectionery and ice cream trades. For some time the manufacturers of ice cream contended that the pure maple product used in flavouring lost much of its flavour on freezing. Research investigations carried out at the instance of the Department, however, showed that this contention was not based on fact, with the result that pure maple flavorings are now being used exclusively with resultant improvement in the flavor and quality of the product.

The Minister also calls attention to the fact that all licenses issued under the Act for the past season must be renewed on or before the end of the present month. Licenses are required by both manufacturers and packers, and owners of sugar bush or orchard using an export business, that is selling their product outside the Province of origin. For manufacturers and packers a license fee of \$20 is charged but for the private owner of a sugar bush or orchard no fee or license is charged. Unless renewal is made by Dec. 31, 1931 licenses and identification numbers issued for use this year automatically lapse and may not again be used. Out of a total of 1020 licenses issued for 1931 over 400 applications for renewal have already been received and dealt with.

Keen Campaign In Australia

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 7.—Only four acclamations were recorded yesterday in nominations for the Federal general election which will take place December 19, while a record total of 229 candidates were named to contest the 75 seats in the House of Representatives.

The feature of the nominations in New South Wales was the opposition of the Federal Laborites and the State Labor group led by Premier J. T. Lang. Lang supporters are also contesting two seats in Queensland. Twenty-nine candidates were nominated for nine seats in the Senate for New South Wales, Queensland and Victoria which are now vacant. Senate nominations in the other states will close this week.

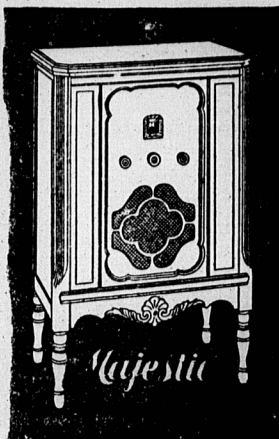

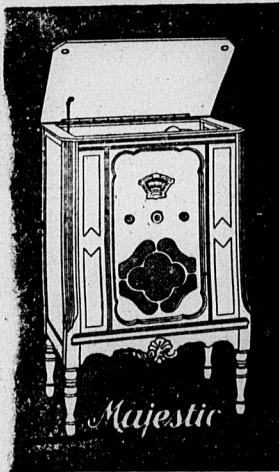

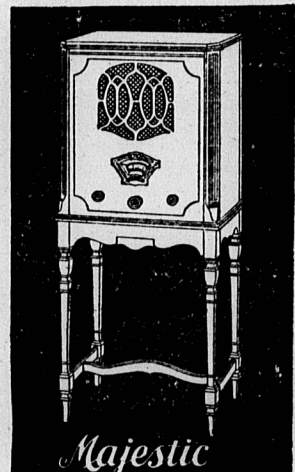

Conference Suggested

OTTAWA, One, Dec. 7. (By the Canadian Press)—Officials of the radio branch of the Dominion Government were interested in a despatch today from Washington forecasting the calling on a North American conference on radio for the purpose of further regulating the use of broadcasting channels, but no comment was available.

The Dominion Government administers the regulations governing radio broadcasting throughout Canada, at present, and the judicial committee of the Privy Council in London will shortly be asked to confirm this authority. The powers of the Dominion Government in this respect were recently challenged which contended that provinces should have control of radio within their borders. The Supreme Court ruled that the Dominion was the sole authority in Canada and the case was appealed to the Privy Council.

Keen Campaign

The defeat of the Labor Government in Australia came on November 25 with dramatic suddenness over the refusal of Prime Minister J. H. Scullin to investigate charges of political bias in the distribution of unemployment relief by Hon. E. G. Theodore, Minister of Finance. The move against the government was made under the leadership of Hon. J. A. Beasley, extremist and former Minister of Health in the Government. The extremists were joined by other parties of the opposition who succeeded in toppling the government on a motion that the House be adjourned.

Angry scenes followed when the Prime Minister shouted across the floor of the House, "You can have your election now, and it's a mighty poor issue to fight on."

The following day Governor-General Sir Isaac Isaacs granted dissolution of Parliament.

Near Tragedy

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 7.—A small hand feebly pressing against the horn of an automobile which

had been parked on the street with the motor running saved four little children from death by carbon monoxide gas here last night.

Though gradually losing consciousness, one of the children, despite a policeman's warning to stop, continued to sound the horn. The policeman opened the door of the automobile and a baby boy rolled into his arms, overcome by the poisonous fumes.

The children, Jeanne D'Arc, Marcelle, Aline and Edouard Jarry, aged 10, 8, 5, and 3, years respectively were laid on the sidewalk and later removed to a hospital. It was reported tonight the children were doing well and practically out of danger.

The four children were waiting in the car for their parents who had gone shopping in a store. The parents came out of the store as the children were being taken to the hospital and when informed of the near tragedy immediately rushed to the hospital.
