PROHIBITION COCKTAIL—The prohibition of one of the largest stock-tails ever produced in this Province took place yesterday morning about 11 o'clock. The component parts consisted of three cases of rye whiskey, two cases and two gallon tins of rum. The mixing took place at a storm sewer at the corner of Dorchester and Queen streets, not far from the Commissioner's warehouse by Inspectors Doyce and Haywood. There was a large crowd present but no samples were given away. The wet goods were taken without warrant, and stored in the prohibition Commissioner's warehouse.

SIGNAL NOTES.

Yesterday morning was occupied chiefly with a muster parade for Lt. Col. Mowbray of the Canadian Permanent Pay Corps who complimented Major Rogers on the fine appearance of the company, and the efficient manner in which the parade was conducted.

Immediately after dinner, the company fell in to be photographed. A number of views were taken of the men at flag drill, cable-drill etc. Several more will be taken tomorrow. These pictures will be sent to Ottawa for official purposes, and incidentally to advertise the Signal Service and to stimulate recruiting in other places.

The cable section today did their first actual training, laying some mile of wire, putting in the necessary pole crossing, busy crossing, tree crossings etc.

Today work will be done with hello graph. It is the intention of Major Rogers to establish a station at Keppoch which will maintain communication with the camp.

The annual classification of signalers will be held today. This is a series of tests to determine whether the previously qualified signalers are maintaining the required standard of efficiency, and to set a standard for the training in this camp. The examinations will be conducted by Major Jones, the camp signalling officer.

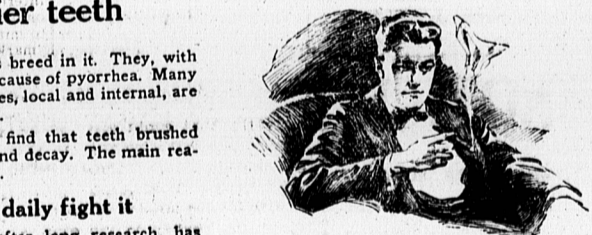
