PRIZE MONEY The total amount offered in prize money for live stock and other exhibits is over \$10,000, and the exhibition as a further inducement to exhibitors will pay transportation charges on all live stock exhibits from any station in the Province up to the minimum carload freight.

Bennett Replies To Allegations Of "Conspiracy" Liberal Charges Prove Boomerang - Documents Reveal Manitoba Gov't. Had Complete Charge Of Road Work In Dispute.

OTTAWA, June 17—In the House of Commons last night Conservative Leader Bennett took up the letter of Ralph Webb, Manitoba Conservative organizer, to Mr. Bennett which threw the House into a tumult last Friday night.

Prime Minister Mackenzie King said then the letter disclosed a conspiracy to influence the elections of three constituencies in Manitoba in the 1938 elections.

Mr. Bennett, then Prime Minister, said that the letter was a "very serious matter" and that he had not suggested fraud, but here is a document upon which grave observations were made and it bears a date in 1936 when it purports to have been made in 1935.

Mr. Rogers said it was the practice of the department to enter in red ink any alterations to agreements agreed upon between the provinces and the Dominion as they were made.

He proposed to read all the documents into the records, confident that the public had all the information it would not be he that would be found blameable but those who had attacked him.

Mr. Bennett read another letter from Mr. Webb to the same effect. He then read the letter from Mr. Webb which had previously been produced and read in the House.

Had Been Altered He said he had tried to obtain the original rule and was told he could only have a copy. Now when the original was produced it contained alterations in red ink. It was obvious the documents were not those signed by Mr. Gordon. Was the rest of the return as inaccurate as this document? Was it all inaccurate?

Mr. Bennett then proceeded to read the agreement and on a clause stating the work was to be started before Oct. 10, 1935, Mr. Rogers interrupted to ask the reason for that.

Mr. Bennett said it was usual in such agreements and was to ensure the work would start before the winter set in. The Manitoba government, a Liberal government, had complete control over the work and the employment of men. It had approved the agreement without objection.

"The only way they could get the money was by signing in those terms," said Mr. Rogers.

Smallness Of Mind "There you have an indication of smallness of mind," said Mr. Bennett. "Just give him a chance and let him show himself. The Minister of labor sits in his place and says Blacken and Cliff sign documents whether they like them or not because it is the only way they can get money."

On the facts as he had read them, Mr. Bennett said, the Prime Minister had "alleged conspiracy on the part of a prime minister of Canada to bribe three constituencies." The documents were not evidence Mr. Bennett said. He was not sure he had ever personally received the Webb letter but certainly had nothing to do with subsequent negotiations.

This whole argument proceeds on an allegation of motives which is against the rules of this House. He had not planned to pay any attention to charges which first appeared last Friday, until questioned by the Prime Minister as to whether he had anything to say.

People Resent "It struck me," Mr. Bennett said, "the decent people of Canada would resent that sort of argument. Am I to be responsible for Ralph Webb's letter? Am I to be charged with conspiracy because Ralph Webb wrote a letter?"

"The government acted upon it," Mr. Mackenzie King interjected. Mr. Bennett replied that the government had acted on pressure of the Manitoba government which would have the spending of the money and the hiring of men.

It may be a good argument against Ralph Webb," Mr. Bennett said, but anybody putting an argument like that in a court of law would not get very far.

But we have cases that do not depend upon inference," Mr. Bennett continued, referring to "Heaps and Woodsworth at Laurier House in the dark days of 1926 when it was not known whether the government could remain in office."

Ruled Out Of Order Mr. Bennett spoke of the situation in 1926 when the Liberal government met parliament without a majority and after Mr. Mackenzie King with nine of his ministers met defeat in the 1926 elections. He said he would refer to discussions between Mr. Mackenzie King and leaders of the third group headed by Mr. Woodsworth, C.C.F. leader, and Mr. Heaps, now C.C.F. member for Winnipeg North.

Mr. Mackenzie King interjected to say he had never at any time "any discussions with Mr. Heaps and Mr. Woodsworth at Laurier House on any matter relating to the political program in this House."

Mr. Bennett said he would accept that statement but would read from Hansard to show what Mr. Woodsworth had said on the subject.

Before Mr. Bennett could proceed to read the Hansard extracts Arthur Slight (Lib. Party) asked Chairman Sanderson if the new turn taken by the discussion was in order. The chairman ruled it out of order and Mr. Bennett accepted the ruling.
