 ably impressed. After the resigned Rev.

 ered he was not doing his duty to the  
 people of his church by retaining his po-  
 sition on the board, as he could not give  
 the Methodist people information  
 regarding the institution when  
 called upon, either locally or  
 by letter. When he met the offi-  
 cials he spoke of the inactivity and in-  
 difference of the managing committee.  
 He did not suppose it was his duty to  
 call the quarterly meetings, as he was  
 neither chairman nor secretary. These  
 meetings were never held.—St. John  
 Star.
