Many friends in Georgetown and elsewhere will learn with deep regret of the death of Miss Cicely MacPhee, which occurred at the home of her niece, Mrs. Allister Macdonald, Georgetown, on Thursday, Dec. 8, after a short illness, which she bore with patience and resignation to God's Holy Will. She was an intelligent, capable and trustworthy, true Christian lady. All that medical aid and kind nursing could do was done, but God called her home. She was visited frequently by her father, Rev. O. Kiggins, who administered the last rites of the Roman Catholic church, of which she was a devoted member. Her brother Rev. Father MacPhee predeceased her some years ago. She leaves to mourn her niece, Mrs. Allister Macdonald, to whom sincere sympathy is extended. The many beautiful Mass Cards, spiritual bouquets and messages of sympathy show the high esteem in which she was held.

The Annual Patrol Leaders' Conference for P. E. I. was held in St. James Church Hall Saturday afternoon and evening. Twenty-four boy leaders from the six Charlottetown Troops attended, out-of-town scouts being unable to be present owing to inclement weather.

This conference was held under the leadership of Asst. Provincial Commissioner Wm. Warren, Provincial Secretary R. C. Parent, and Scoutmaster C. Walker.

The meeting was conducted under the patrol system, that is, the boys were divided into three patrol groups, Maitland, Owen, Call Vinnicombe and Ivan Walsh acting as leaders.

The conference took the form of discussion on a number of topics, relating particularly to the duties of patrol leaders, interspersed by games and songs, conducted by the patrol leaders. The following topics were discussed: Patrol Discipline, Building a Patrol Program, The Patrol Corner, The Court of Honour, The Patrol Leader's Job, Patrol Spirit, Proficiency Badges, Camp for 1932, Jamboree.

Mr. Hopkins had driven his wife to visit at the home of her uncle and returned home to do some work on his car, intending to call for her later. When he failed to arrive Mrs. Hopkins phoned her house, but on receiving no response she returned home to find her husband dead beneath his car in the garage, death being due to carbon monoxide gas. Mrs. Hopkins was formerly Miss Margaret (Peg) MacKenzie of Long Creek, and the sympathy of her many friends goes out to her in her bereavement.
