

Concert at Uigg.

According to notice Uigg concert was held on Friday Feb. 1st. Long before the appointed time the hall was filled to its utmost capacity, and even standing room was at a premium. The hall had been nicely decorated for the occasion. Two magnificent Union Jacks formed the background of the stage; a screen to the left shut off a space for the lady performers, while to the right a similar screen reserved a place for the gentlemen. Mr. John J. Macleod occupied the chair, and after a few appropriate remarks read out the first item of the program. The curtain rose at 7.30 and the patriotic strains of Britannia from a choir of Uigg's famous singers, only gave the audience a vague idea of what was to follow. A reading by Mr. W. D. Ross, followed and was suitably applauded. A solo by Mr. James Moore, the celebrated vocalist of Pownal, held the audience spellbound, and only too soon the falling of the curtain announced his departure from the stage. McKinnon was received with the greatest applause and the wall of the building fairly shook so great was the encore. Mr. McKinnon was accompanied by Miss Louise MacLeod. The forcible manner in which Mr. James D. McLeod recited the "The Ever Present Crisis" shows his great ability as an elocutionist. The program was brought to a close by the singing of the "Maple Leaf" Miss Jessie R. MacLeod acted as organist for choir to the utmost satisfaction of those engaged. Address to Her Majesty.

To Be Signed by all Women of Canada.

The National Council of Women of Canada, in compliance with the wishes of a large number of women, both members of Council and others, have decided, with the hearty approval of Her Excellency the Countess of Minto, to send the following message to Her Majesty Queen Alexandra:—

"May it please your Majesty. As women of Canada, we would humbly convey to His Majesty King Edward VII and to You His Illustrations Consort, through the National Council of Women of Canada, our sincere congratulations on Your accession to the throne, and the assurance of our perpetual love and fealty.

We have the greater confidence in making this approach by reason of the gracious message sent by our late beloved Sovereign Lady, Queen Victoria, on the seventh day of July, eighteen hundred and ninety-seven, to the National Council of Women of Canada, in response to their congratulations on the completion of the sixtieth year of Her Majesty's reign. Words fail us to tell of our love for Her. We praise God for Her long and glorious reign, and we enshrine Her in our hearts as one who bore, through a long tale of years, as Queen and Woman, a stainless sceptre.

Your Majesties have been endeared to Your subjects in all parts of Your dominions by the breadth of Your sympathies and Your many activities for the general good. You have long been held in honor for the untiring devotion and constant self-forgetfulness with which You have fulfilled the onerous duties devolving on You in ever increasing measure by the advancing years of our late beloved Queen, and as we thank God for Her, so we pray that this Empire may long enjoy the beneficent rule of His Gracious Majesty, and of You His Illustrations Consort."

All Canadian women are invited to join in this expression of appreciation and loyalty by attaching their signatures thereto. The address will be engrossed and, together with the signatures, handsomely bound in Morocco. In order to meet the considerable outlay which this will involve, all those signing the Address are requested to contribute two cents, or more, towards defraying the expense; these contributions may be in stamps. Signatures will be received up to the 15th of March.

Tuberculosis in Cattle.

OTTAWA, February 15.—A deputation of cattlemen holding opposite views on the tuberculosis test and other regulations affecting tuberculosis stock, interviewed the minister of agriculture to-day with a view of having made some regulation more acceptable to all. Mr. Edwards championed the present regulations requiring a rigid tuberculin test in quarantine of all imported cattle, while Mr. David McCrae, of Guelph, advocated the abolition of test not only in quarantine but all over the country.

Hon. Sydney Fisher is not in favor of abolishing the test but a compromise was agreed on, whereby changes in method of administering the test will be made. It was agreed that legislation should be introduced abolishing the law that now prohibits the selling of hides of tuberculosis stock.

Infant Perishes in a Building.

A St. John despatch says: "Groping in the smoke of a dwelling house at Mountain Brook Restigouche county, on Tuesday night a servant man caught at a bundle of clothing and carried it out thinking it was Mr. McIntyre's infant child. When the mistake was discovered the flames were too fierce to permit of a return to the building and the little one perished. The house was burned to the ground.

"The owner was away, and Mrs. McIntyre, her two children and the hired man were the occupants. All were asleep and the fire awoke them. Mrs. McIntyre escaped with the eldest child and called to the man to save the baby. When she found the terrible mistake which had been made, the mother was frantic. The house was insulated the night was bitterly cold and the mother and eldest child were half perished before they reached shelter."
