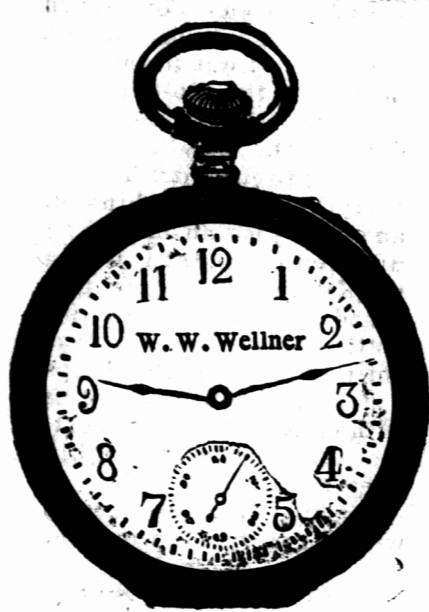

Mr. Dickie has recently been appointed to the pastorate of a church in Cape Breton, but this could be otherwise arranged and might not necessarily prevent his accepting St. Andrew's pulpit.—St. John Star.

BEDQUE NEWS— W. T. BOWNESS has up to the present bought five tons of poultry two of which he shipped to Newfoundland. The prices paid were for turkeys dressed thirteen cents per lb; geese, ten cent; chickens, nine and ten; hens, seven and eight. Among the largest sellers were Artimas Clark with seventy five dollars worth; Wm McCallum, seventy; P. McBride, sixty; L. U. Fowler, forty six; A. E. Farrow, forty one. Mr. Bowness is still buying largely chickens for his canning establishment.—The Duck River Dairying Company have had a most successful season. A statement is being issued by the Secretary giving besides the amount of milk received during July, August and part of September when butter was manufactured. The average price paid per hundred lbs during that time was 61 1/2 cents. Also a statement showing the amount of milk received during the latter part of September and October when cheese was made. The average price paid for milk per cwt 84. As the milk is bought by the per cent of butter fat it contains some of the patrons receive a much higher price per lb than others, for instance during the cheese season when the average price paid was 84 cents, Daniel Nuttall received \$1.30 per hundred lbs, Albert Schurman and others who have Jersey cows received over one dollar per hundred. Upward of sixteen thousand lbs is being received at the factory each week now, on Tues days and Fridays which is manufactured into butter. The factory will be operated during the whole winter.—Jesse Schurman the efficient butter and cheese maker in order to devote his whole time and attention to the factory has rented his farm to Thomas Moyses and has an auction to dispose of his stock implements on Tuesday 15th inst.—Mrs. Nuttall widow of the late Louis Nuttall, Cape Traverse, and Mrs. Wright, widow of the late Jesse Wright, Middleton will reside at Central Bdeque for the winter. They will occupy the house lately vacated by Murdoch Gullis.—John A. Stewart who has been with W. B. Lear, Souris has taken a position in the tailor shop of Wm Callbeck. Mr. Stewart is well known here and his many friends are pleased to see him back again looking so well after his serious illness. He speaks in highest praise of the P. E. I. hospital where he was during an operation for appendicitis.

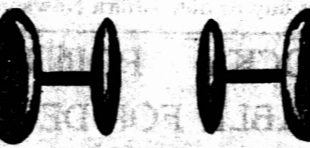
HE WILL SUSPEND BUSINESS.

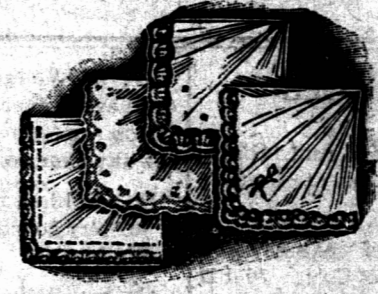
