## THREE CORNERED TIE IN MERCANTILE LOOP

### Accidents Mar Tilt As Hawks Defeat Abbies

#### Knucker Irvine In Hospital. As Result Of Head-on Crash Into Boards. Kane Suffers Hip Injury.

**MONCTON, Dec. 3**—Moncton Hawks stopped the marauding Charlottetown Abegweits who have been creating havoc among the teams of the Maritime Mercantile League, here tonight. The Allan Cup champions won a wide-open, flashy, dazzling game 5-4 and the decision might just as easily have gone the other way to close what was a play throughout.

The game was marred by two accidents in which players were injured although the game was not rough. Knucker Irvine, fast skating left wing star of the Hawks is in the city hospital in a semi-conscious condition with a badly bruised jaw and a serious neck. His condition is not regarded as serious although he will likely be out of the game for a few days. Irvine was hurt when he crashed head first into the back boards near the Moncton goal. Back-checking furiously Irvine attempted to make a wide sweeping scoop-up of the puck from the corner when he slipped. Going at full speed he didn't have time to raise a hand to defend himself and crashed head-on into the boards.

**KANE INJURED**  
 This accident was about mid-way through the third session but in the second period Jack "Hurricane" Kane was carried from the ice, writhing in pain as the result of a check by Knucker Irvine. He sustained a severe injury to a sciatic nerve, in the hip and an attending physician stated after an examination of the player. He was unable to return to the game but it is believed he will not be out of action for any length of time.

Faced by Bill Miller who turned a bang-up game in all departments and who scored three of the five goals, the Hawks played aggressive hockey all the way through and paid little attention to their defence in an effort to beat the career Abbies at their own game. They succeeded, but only by a "hair" as it were.

Walter "Nig" Brenneman, who turned in a rousing game for the Abbies, opened the scoring about mid-way through the first period while Duke McDonald of the Hawks and Ray Gettiffe of the Abbies were in the penalty box for mixing it. Desilets was stopped at the Moncton blue-line but Brenneman breezed through to the corner of the net.

**THE SCORE**  
 The Hawks tied the score while Frank Currie was in the hoosegow. James taking Marshall's pass and played in to Miller after drawing defence out of position. Miller scored in close before firing. The champions went ahead early in a free-scoring second period, taking advantage of a penalty to Brenneman. James was blocked at the Island defence but still the puck ahead to Miller who fired at the goal. Pete Kelly, who was one of the brightest lights of the game and an outstanding performer, deadlocked the score again about three minutes later, and it was in this play that "Hurricane" Kane was injured. The Hurricane whipped a pass to the right wing mate just as he was blocked by Irvine and Kelly carried it into the goal. Moncton players claimed the straight through the Abbies' defence, but then Abbies declared Miller's goal earlier in the period was offside.

**PUPS CHAMPS AHEAD**  
 Irvine put the champions in the lead again on a brilliant individual effort, the finest one-handed effort of the evening, but Pete Kelly tied this goal less than a couple minutes later on a pass from Desilets. Before the period was over, however, Miller crashed straight through the Charlottetown fourth and fired in Moncton's fourth goal.

It was left to Duke McDonald to show what he proved to be the winning goal early in the third period when he took a pass from Miller and caught the Island defence flat-footed, back-handing a shot past the Abbies' goal.

Abegweits skating like red demons never halted their stride and a gang play in which four of the entire forward line and Currie from the defence, took part. Brenneman tallied the last goal of the game. Both teams missed as

**McNamara Is Forced Out Of Race**

**NEWARK, N.J., Dec. 3**—It took a stomach-ache of the acute variety to do what broken bones of various sizes never could do—keep Reggie McNamara, the "grand old man" of six-day bicycle racing, out of the annual winter whiz at New York's Madison Square Garden.

For the first time since 1913, when McNamara came up from Australia, the aging iron man was missing from the starting lineup in the New York race which started last night. A substitute was hastily enrolled and it was learned that McNamara was confined to his home here with the above mentioned stomach ache, diagnosed as acute indigestion.

The race, of course, went on but it hardly seemed like a Madison Square Garden grind without the gnarled Australian, long a favorite of the galleries. Often before he had been forced to tape tightly his collar-bone or his ribs or his nose to keep pedalling away, but for 21 years he never before missed the season's big event.

**ABEGWEITS HAD** their winning streak halted at Moncton last night but in losing they lost none of the prestige they have lately gained. Press reports say it was an even battle all the way through, with the play wide open and dazzling. Hawks deserve a lot of credit for their brilliant comeback and showed conclusively that they still possess the fighting spirit that carried them to two Allan Cup victories. Local fans, while a little disappointed at the outcome nevertheless treated the defeat philosophically, taking the stand, as a result of the stalemate at Halifax, that the Abegweits will once more open up a gap between themselves and the Hawks on Wednesday night.

And by the way the coming battle at the Forum should be a great struggle. Hawks by their two recent wins have regained a lot of confidence while the locals, now that the strain of keeping a winning streak intact, will be out to start a new one on its way.

**THE DISAPPOINTING** angle to last night's game was the report of the injury to Jackie Kane. The diminutive "Hurricane" playing the hockey of his career this season, has been the league's outstanding centre to date and it is to be hoped that the injury will not keep him out of the lineup. Hawks, also suffered a casualty to their speedy left winger, Knucker Irvine. Should the "Knucker" be out any length of time, Moncton will feel his loss keenly, as the dashing, speedy style of the Hawk speedster has played an important part in the Hawks' offensive.

**PROBABLY THE** stiffest workout to date was held by Abbie Intermediates yesterday morning, the boys going through a stiff hour and a half drill. As in the case in the Junior ranks, large numbers are turning out for practice each morning, an indication of the hockey interest that is sweeping the Province this season. Out of town candidates are increasing in number and by the form some of them are showing bid fair to give the older members of the squad a battle royal for the respective positions.

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### WOLVERINES AND BEAVERS PLAY TIE

#### Monson Deadlocks Count With 12 Seconds to Go—Teams Fail to Score in Overtime.

**HALIFAX, Dec. 3**—Walter Monson, flashy Saint John centre, changed the aspect of the four Mercantile Hockey League tonight when he scored a tying goal against Halifax Wolverines in the last 12 seconds of play with his team one man short. His bombshell goal kept an almost certain victory and league leadership from the Wolves who had been trying to salt away a 3-2 win.

As far as play went, the first two periods were all Wolverine. Ron Hudson, former Abegweits right winger, scored a goal on a pass from Owen Lennon just 33 seconds after the game began. Then Lennon sent the Wolves into a two goal lead one minute after the second period got under way. Although Beavers went into the scoring column five minutes later with left winger O'Leary banging defenseman Draper's weak shot past Bubar, the Wolves regained their two-goal lead shortly before the end of the same period when Mickey McGlashen denied the twines on a play in which Hudson and Lennon, other Wolverines—two goal-getters, figured.

**Beavers Rally**  
 But in the all-important third period, the Beavers, determined to close out the homesters' lead, swarmed all around the Bubar citadel in rush after rush and cashed in two goals on perfect plays to tie the score. Bill Walker grabbed Bubar's defence twice after the latter had come far out of his goal to stop Red Farrel's drive, and easily slipped the puck into the goal. Many fans were out of the rink, confident of a Wolverine win, when Monson scored his surprising tally. Short one man, Beavers nevertheless kept pressing with all men up. All might have been well for the homesters had Vince Ferguson rushed instead of trying to bang the puck down the ice. As it was Houston stopped the puck at the blue-line, sent it in to Monson who shot high into the net through a crowd of players.

**Penalties Few**  
 Although penalties dished out by Referee Ernie Davin were comparatively few in number during the 70 minutes of play, one of them paved the way for Beaver's opening goal.

With Ferguson off, O'Leary was waiting just outside the goal crease when Draper shot through defense from the line. O'Leary increased its speed and changed its direction when he banged it past Duddy Bubar. At other times neither team was able to capitalize on short-handedness of the opposition. Once at the beginning of the overtime, the Beavers were two men short with O'Leary and Draper in the cooler, but the Wolverines were unable to score what would have proved the deciding goal.

**Wolves Over-Confident**  
 The main reason for the tie-score was over-confidence on the part of the Wolverines. With the game nearly over, they were content with banging the puck down the ice. When O'Leary took his penalty they had several chances for dangerous rushes with the Beavers all up, but they let them slip, and Monson was able to score his tying goal.

Past, wide-open, and rough, the game kept a small crowd on their toes from going to sleep, although many thought the whistle blew too frequently and booed Davin whenever his hand went to his lips.

The McGlashen-Lennon-Hudson line scored all the Wolverine goals and was the outstanding line of the night. The Beaver front-line of Monson, O'Leary and Dickson displayed the best combination and were the main cog in the Saint John attack.

### Gehrig Home Run King Leads League In Batting

**CHICAGO, Dec. 2**—Lou Gehrig, Major League baseball's second "Iron Man" holder of the big time record for service in consecutive games at 1,504, crashed his way to his first American League batting championship, the official figures reveal tonight.

Gehrig, who kept on hitting all kinds of pitching even after his team, New York's Yankees, faded before the title drive of Detroit Tigers, finished with a mark of 383. Not content with that, he won the home-run title with 49 round-trip blows, leading the 1933 champion in batting and homers, Jimmy Foss of Philadelphia Athletics, by five.

He also topped the league with 409 in total bases pounded out, 115 singles, 40 doubles and six triples in addition to his home-runs. He landed third to Charley Gehringer, second baseman and sparking of the Tigers, in scoring and second in number of hits. Gehringer scored 134 runs, Bill Werber of Boston had 129, while Gehrig crossed hostile plates 128 times. Gehrig's hit output was 214, four more than Gehrig produced.

Werber displaced Ben Chapman of the Yankees, as high man in base stealing with 40 thefts. Jo-Jo White of another Tiger, finished second with 28, and Chapman took third place at 26.

### PIRROME K.O.'S WALKER

**PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 3**—Paul Pirrome of Cleveland knocked out Mickey Walker of Shrewsbury, Mass., N.J., in the 11th round of their scheduled 12-round bout tonight.

Two short chops to the jaw and for the first time in his long career Walker was counted out. The two blows were struck with lightning rapidity after two minutes, 19 seconds of the 11th round. Eleven thousand spectators sat in surprised silence as the referee counted over the popular battler.

Walker was knocked down for a count of nine by a hard right hook on the point of his jaw in the second round and he never seemed to fully recover from the effects of the punch.

Pirrome, at 159, outboxed the 160-pound "toy bulldog" in nearly all the chapters.

### LEAF SNIPERS LEAD LEAGUE IN SCORING

#### Harvey Jackson Holds First Position Closely Followed By Conacher.

**MONTREAL, Dec. 3**—While Toronto Maple Leafs' winning streak has finally been snapped, the dominance of the Leafs' wingmen in the National Hockey League's scoring records continued unabated, the weekly statistics issued tonight showed.

The four goals scored by Toronto in defeating St. Louis at Toronto Saturday night further strengthened the positions of Harvey Jackson and Charlie Conacher at the top of the whole league.

Conacher, first player this season to reach double figures in goals scored, held first place with 19 goals, four assists and 14 points. The goals and seven assists.

New York Americans' four-game winning streak was reflected in the advance of Dave "Sweeney" Schriner, one of the finds of the season, to a tie for third place with Earl Robinson of Maroons in the Canadian division, each with seven points.

Detroit has a solid hold of top positions in the United States section. Red Wings, who have scored 26 goals in nine games, lead off with Johnny Sorrell, 4-7-11, followed by Cooney Weiland and Larry Aurie, tied with nine points and Eddie Goodfellow, highest scoring defenseman in the league to date, with eight points.

Red Horner, rugged Toronto defenseman, held his leadership in penalties with 38 minutes, followed by Goodfellow with 26. Marty Barry, Boston and Baldy Northcott Maroons, each with 24, are next.
