June term of Supreme Court Opens today

The June term of the Supreme Court opens this morning at 11 o'clock. There are five indictments, three appeals and one civil jury case on the docket.

Indictments include: The King vs. Rodrick Steele, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses (set over from the last Court term); The King vs. John Jeremiah Gallant and Ivan Lund, theft of car (set over from last term); The King vs. Jeremiah Doucette, causing grievous bodily harm (set over from last term); The King vs. Frederick Phillips and Earl Lund, charged with murder; The King vs. Albert Griffin and Harry R. Walsh, conspiracy.

Appeals include: The King vs. William R. McKenzie, charged with taking a car without the owner's consent; The King vs. Pansy McLeod, charged under the Excise Act; The King vs. Pansy McLeod, charged under the Prohibition Act.

Rotarians hear Talk on "the Gift of courage"

Mr. Robert Bell, former Manager of the North American Life Insurance Company of Manitoba, addressed the weekly luncheon of the Rotarians yesterday on the topic "The Gift of Courage."

Familiar with seven out of the nine provinces of Canada Mr. Bell analyzed some aspects of Canada's attitude toward the war and admitted that certain sections of the present trend of world events, and fearful of what may happen after the great struggle now going on is that democracy has failed, and the church has failed, and that inflation may come. These opinions are not held by the majority of our people but they are held by an unthinking small number.

"Democracy," declared Mr. Bell, "is not understood by these people. Democracy must take the middle of the road and it must listen to the wishes of the people—the workers. The men who head soulless corporations must reckon with their responsibilities to the common people."

Mr. Bell coupled a tribute to the British people, a quotation from Walter Hynes-Paige, former American Ambassador to England: "When a German knows he is going to die his emotion breaks forth and he weeps pitifully, but Tommy Atkins is silent as if he had a secret with the Almighty."
