(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, April 22.—Moderate to fresh, westerly winds fair and milder.

ANDERSON WINS WRESTLING MATCH

The match was probably the best ever put on here, each man going in with the determination to win and each of them a master in his line. Anderson was mainly the aggressor and during the first part of the match had Forbes in many tight places, but Forbes showed unusual strength and agility in getting away.

After thirty-one minutes of wrest ling Forbes secured the first fall on a scissors and arm hold. For the next few minutes the wrestlers went right after each other at a swift pace and after a few minutes from time Anderson got the second fall. Forbes did not give in but the referee award ed the fall to Anderson to prevent the possible breaking of Forbes' an gle. The next fall was obtained by

Anderson after nine minutes' hot ter put on a crotch and half Nelson hold.

Anderson showed more head work and experience in the art than his op ponent. Forbes is heavier and strong er than Anderson and is certainly a strong claimant for the belt which Anderson now holds.

Round after round of applause greeted the good work of the wrest lers and everybody seemed satisfied that they had received extra good value for their money.

SWEDE RUNNER WINS BOSTON MARATHON

BOSTON, April 21.—Marathon lau rels were gathered to-day by Fritz Carlsson, a young Swedish athlete of the Jock and Gyn, Minneapolis, who cap tured the seventeenth annual Ameri can long distance classic in fast, but not record-breaking time. The Minn esotan covered the 26 miles of roll ing roadway in two hours, twenty five minutes 14.4 seconds, which is three minutes 52.5 seconds slower than the record established last year by Mike Ryan of New York.

Andrew Sockalexis, the Old Town, Maine, Indian, was second by exactly two minutes, and Henry J. Smith, of the Bronx house, New York, who set the pace for three quarters of the dis tance, during which he made new times at several checking points, was a good third.

Sockalexis, it turned out later, was fighting for an added prize in the form of the hand of Pauline Shea, of Penobscot, who waited anxiously at the finish and swooned as the Indian staggered across the line. When Miss Shea had been revived she told the judge that she would marry the man anyway.

Carlson's time has been beaten only three times in sixteen previous years. This was his second Boston Marathon attempt. Last year he fin ished fifth. Carlsson and Sockalexis both made a waiting and carefully planned contest, being content to trail half a mile behind the leader for the greater part of the way, while conserving their strength and speed for the final dash. Much of the credit for Smith's fast time in the early stages was due to William Hallan, a Hamilton, Ontario, ten miler.

The Canadian was dangerous until the hills of Newton forced him to rest. Later he resumed, finishing in 27th place.

AUTOS MAY RUN IN P. E. I.

Premier Strongly in Favor of Proposed Legislation

Charlottetown, P. E. I., April 17.—Premier Matheson, moved a resolution in the Prince Edward Island Legisla ture today that it is expedient to in troduce an act to permit the use of automobiles on certain days on the public highways. The Premier made a strong speech in favor of the resolu tion. He went very fully into the ques tion, referring to the changed feeling in regard to automobiles. The new bill, he said, would provide very stringent regulations and when it passed he did not propose to have it put into operation until the people have an opportunity to consider it carefully.

Hon. John McBean, Hon. Charles Dalton, Hon. Wm. S. Stewart and Hon. Murdock McKinnon spoke in favor.

It is proposed to limit the running of automobiles to three days.

The fees from licensees are to go towards the upkeep of the roads.
