NEW YORK HIPPODROME.

The New York Hippodrome revival of "H. M. S. Pinafore" has proven such an unqualified success that the air is full of wild rumors concerning similar operatic works to follow. Nearly every standard light opera, from "The Chimes of Normandy" to "The Queens Lace Handkerchief" has been mentioned as a possible candidate for presentation on the huge Hippodrome stage.

As a matter of fact the liberal public patronage that greeted "Pinafore" has not and will not lure the Hippodrome Management into a definite, permanent change of policy. The vast playhouse will remain the house of spectacular sensationalism, expressed in one annual creation from the mental storehouse of Arthur Voegelin, although it is entirely within the range of possibilities that an annual Spring season of light opera may become a fixed feature at the Hippodrome.

One fact has been demonstrated that pleased the management above all other things—the traditional view of the Hippodrome as merely a sublimated circus has been shattered forever. Mr. J. McWilliams was called to the chair and the undersigned was appointed to act as secretary of the meeting.

Mr. McWilliams then opened the meeting with a few well chosen remarks and called on Mr. Marcellus assistant Dominion Poultry Representative who was present to address the meeting. Mr. Marcellus responded in a very pleasing and able manner, touching at first on co-operative farming in general after which he confined his remarks to the care and feeding of hens and the marketing of eggs. He showed by facts and figures that the Dominion has been losing about four million \$4,000,000 annually by handling and marketing its eggs in a careless and unsystematic manner. He pointed out that the country was losing 17 per cent. of the profits on their eggs, by this unfortunate system. He stated that egg circles had been started to connect this evil and affirmed that whereas only 33 per cent. of eggs marketed in the former slovenly manner proved to be first-class, that those marketed by egg circles had proved to be 90 per cent. first-class. After the speaker had made many other instructive and interesting remarks he invited discussion on the subject in response to which quite a lengthy discussion followed, after which the chairman suggested to the meeting that if they thought of forming a circle to move a resolution to that effect and he would put it to the meeting. In response to this suggestion a resolution was moved and seconded, and upon being submitted to the meeting was carried by a unanimous vote. Seven directors were then nominated and appointed as follows, namely D. J. Thompson, A. J. Robison, E. Humphrey, Bowley Leard, J. A. Bogerson, Alex. Wood and John T. Dawson. It was resolved that the name of the circle be the Tryon Egg Marketing Association. It was further resolved that F. G. Lang and Arthur Dawson be auditors of the circle. Mr. Marcellus then read over the by-laws governing circles which were adopted. A vote of thanks was then tendered Mr. Marcellus and also one to the children to which they each made short but suitable replies, after which the meeting was concluded, all being very much pleased with the proceedings.
